The only difference today is that this campy vampire film goes great with some hair metal on vinyl and some good craft beers.


Reminiscent of the classic From Dusk Till Dawn, but shot almost a decade earlier, Vamp features some of the best vampire effects of any 1980s film courtesy of the great Greg Cannom. There's even a stripping scene (or "exotic dance" if you're one of those horn dogs who considers themselves classy) featuring Grace Jones, which seems to be a direct influence on the Salma Hayek introduction scene in From Dusk Till Dawn. Vamp also stars horror vet Robert Rusler from Weird Science and A Nightmare on Elm Street 2: Freddy's Revenge as a young hunk hoping to join a frat. Michelle's younger sister DeeDee Pfeiffer also gives a command performance as a funny and totally '80s-attired strip club waitress. When two frat hopefuls find out they need a stripper to bring back to the fraternity, they unfortunately choose a strip club full of vampires. If you ever wondered what it was like if Mötley Crüe's "Girls, Girls, Girls"

video was put in a blender with Nosferatu, then I suggest you check out Vamp. Get it on Blu-ray before Grace Jones finds out you didn't and kicks your wimpy ass!

This month's metal pick is a mashup that you can make all by yourself! Grab your copy of Mötley Crüe's Girls, Girls, Girls and simultaneously crank it up alongside Grim Reaper's classic tune "Night of the Vampire," and you get the perfect metal song to compliment Vamp!
