



2. THE CURE: 40 Live Curaetion 25 + Anniversary (Eagle Rock)

Captured in 2018 at London's Royal Festival Hall as part of the Robert Smith-curated Meltdown Festival, 'Cureaetion 25' sees the The Cure performing a song from each of their thirteen studio albums in order. Thanks to Eagle Rock it's now been released with 'Anniversary: 1978-2018', a 29-song concert film in front of 65,000 outdoors in London. Holding both crowds in the palm of their collective hand, this is The Cure at their very best.



3. AGNOSTIC FRONT: THE GODFATHERS OF HARDCORE


(McFarland & Pecci Films)
Getting a well deserved UK TV release in 2019, 'Agnostic Front: The Godfathers Of Hardcore' tells the tale of a band who defined a culture, who solidified a movement. Focused on Roger Miret and Vinnie Stigma, t's part love letter to old New York City and part historical documentation of the trials and tribulations of a hardcore legend. Funny, tragic and utterly compelling.



4. SUZI Q

(Cadiz)

À Vive Le Rock Awards winner this year, Suzi Quatro is the subject of Liam Firmager's documentary 'Suzi Q'. Charting the career and life of the Detroit-born rocker as she broke into the mainstream as something of a novelty at the time (there were almost no women in rock then) and proceeded to rip up the rulebook and the establishment. Documenting a remarkable 50-plus years on the road, it's essential watching.



5. THE POLICE: EVERYONE STARES

(Eagle Rock)

A first person account of how one band went from toiling away in absolute obscurity to headlining stadiums around the world and shooting to the top of the charts, 'The Police: Everyone Stares' is the brainchild of the band's drummer Stewart Copeland. Culled from over fifty hours of Super 8 footage that Copeland shot during their peak years, it puts viewers literally behind the kit with The Police.

ANTI-NOWHERE LEAGUE: WE ARE THE LEAGUE

(Cleopatra) Since coming together in 1980, the Anti-Nowhere League have thrilled and offended in equal measure. 'We Are The League' tells the full, uncensored, warts 'n' all story of how "a biker, a skinhead, a grammar school boy and a Persian exile came together", hilariously with "no musical talent or ambitions and even less respect for anything or anyone". Directed by George Hencken, it's a professionally filmed epic that sheds new light on Animal and company, pulling absolutely no punches and holding nothing

back.
