BJORK Royal Opera House (One Little Indian)
BJORK Volumen 1993-2003 (One Little Indian)

Royal Opera House captures Bjork's magical 2001 London gig in all its transcendent glory. Accompanied by a full orchestra, Inuit choir, harp player and Matmos, she delivers a breathtaking 90-minute set culled mostly from her orchestral masterpiece, Vespertine, plus some old favourites. Meanwhile, Volumen 1993-2003 chronicles every Bjork video ever made, from the Spike Jonze-directed manic musical "It's Oh So Quiet" to the auto-erotic-lesbian-

THE CURE Trilogy (Eagle Rock)

Last year, The Cure performed two concerts in Berlin during which they played all three albums in their "dark trilogy" — 1982's Pornography, 1989's Disintegration and 2000's Bloodflowers — track for track. SHANE MACGOWAN The Shane MacGowan Story:
If I Should Fall From Grace (MVD/Koch)

Clocking in at 110 minutes, If I Should Fall From Grace tells the tragic story of gifted songwriter Shane MacGowan, former singer for The Pogues. While MacGowan continues to make music with The Popes, it's his personal life that's become the greater source of interest, in much the same way that people slow down to stare at car wrecks and blazing buildings. Through a series of interviews with MacGowan, his family and collaborators (including Nick

Cave and ex-Pogue Philip Chevron), If I Should Fall studiously documents both MacGowan's creative genius and the alcoholism that may put him in an early grave. Bonus features include extra interviews, singalong options (though not as many as you'd like) and a heartbreaking conversation between MacGowan and The Clash's Paul Simonon.—JH


SIMON AND GARFUNKEL The Concert In Central Park
