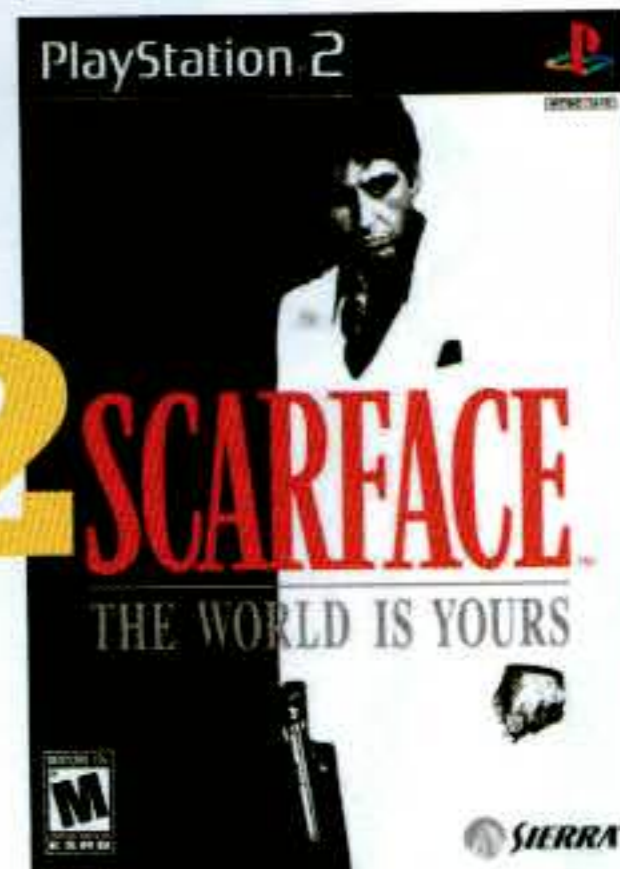

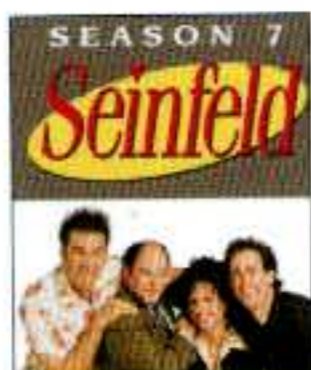

Seinfeld Season 7 (Sony Pictures) A day doesn't pass without hearing a reference to this classic TV show. This DVD set features all 24 episodes from the seventh season, which marked the departure of co-creator Larry David. Features memorable episodes "Master of His Domain," "The Soup Nazi," "The Invitation," and tons of special features. Thirteen hours of viewing that will help you endure any blizzard or international flight.

STS9: Live As Time Changes (Sci Fidelity) Road dogs Sound Tribe Sector 9 consistently tour and expand their thriving fan base without the trappings of a major label deal. This DVD shows the reason for their success: it's all about the music. Recorded over the course of the band's legendary sold out three night NYE stint at Atlanta, GA's Tabernacle, the electronic-rock band navigates through 14 tunes, while obliterating genre limitations.

Eagles of Death Metal / DVD by Sexy (Downtown) The companion DVD to Eagles of Death Metal's *Death By Sexy* is a painfully dull glimpse into the recording sessions and rehearsals for the album. There's nothing cool or funny about these guys (who, to be fair, do play a decent brand of T. Rex-style rock). Watching them bicker, moan and chew the fat is about as fun as watching paint dry. John Ashcroft's "Let the Eagle Soar" is ten times more enjoyable.

Bad Brains / Live at CBGB 1982 (MVD) When you were in diapers, Bad Brains were tearing up the hardcore scene. Thank goodness someone decided to record the quartet's show at the now displaced Mecca of punk. The band rips through "Big Take Over" and "Attitude" with skill and raw flair and tap their reggae roots on standouts like "I and I Rasta." As punters stage dive and mosh, volatile lead singer H.R. pauses the show and asks for help for a bleeding in the pit before launching into their closing classic, "Pay to Cum." What a band.
