Bad Brains Live at CBGB 1982 (MVD VISUAL)







Dr. Katz Professional Therapist Season Two







Danielson **Danielson: A Family Movie** (HVE)



Mortiis Soul in a Hole (EARACHE)



Imagine if Trent Reznor were a troll who lived in Norway. Although looking like a figment of someone's nightmare, he is oh so real. He is Mortiis. Dark wave industrial monster. Blending the smooth synthesizer strides with stop/start walls of distorted guitar, the formula is both at once familiar and fresh, as it is being filtered through a Norwegian hobgoblin. This DVD representation is a live set of 14 songs recorded in London, four videos showing the Goth-troll in action, some

interview footage and some behind the scenes for the video shoot on "The Grudge". What might catch a few novice listeners off guard is the underlying melodies that Mortiis employ. For as intense as the image may portray, the aggression is honed down to a minimal blue cold hate. Songs often pull back to the barest, most icy slow movements to set up the car crash tempos and climactic song builds. There isn't a lot in Mortiis that hasn't been done better by Mr. Reznor, but Mortiis always delivers a quality product with a cool image. It won't replace NIN in your collection, but should snuggle its pointed troll nose right up next to it. mortiis.com
