

Loudquietloud :: A Film About the Pixies



In my mind <u>The Pixies</u> canon is hallowed ground, so much so that I opted out of seeing them live when they re-formed in 2004 for fear the experience might taint the music and memories for me. After watching this <u>DVD I</u> see that my fears were unwarranted as the band comes off as tight as they were when I saw them live at 16 in 1991. I'm impressed.

The <u>documentary</u> follows the reunited foursome from their first

rehearsals together in twelve years through to the end of their exceptionally successful tour.

Expertly scored by Daniel Lanois, *Loudquietloud_succeeds* in pulling back the curtain just enough to witness the inner workings of the group without sacrificing too much of the magic. Speaking of magic, in a few bizarre scenes you get to witness drummer David Lovering perform magic, as he now works as a professional magician at L.A.'s famed Magic Castle.
