### Radiohead: DVD

A Classic Album Under Review: OK Computer

A Classic Album Under Review: OK Computer focuses on Radiohead's critically lauded album originally released on June 16, 1997. The DVD features intelligent commentary from British rock critics, journalists, and Radiohead biographers. It is evident that those featured in the documentary are knowledgeable about music as a whole and about the band's full catalog, not merely this specific album. (This isn't "I Love the '80s" style babbling.) The film takes the viewer through a track-by-track analysis of OK Computer, at times stripping the songs down to their basic chords, which are played on piano onscreen, and also dissecting lyrics lineby-line. The critics discuss the band's influences - musically, artistically, and politically-and audio and visual clips are helpfully provided for that which they reference. Further, live concert footage is interspersed throughout the commentary. Themes of the album are debated in an unbiased way; at one point, an argument against a song's greatness is given, but it comes forth in an "I see where they're coming from" way, for these reviewers clearly feel that the band is worthy of the praise they have received. These critics respect Thom Yorke as an artist and the band for their efforts to stay culturally and artistically relevant by engaging with the world. Worth noting is that commentators focused on the band as a whole, not just the guy at the microphone.

One can learn new things about the album by watching the DVD, and at 59 minutes, it's just long enough to be informative without hitting a dull spot during which one's eyes would wander down to one's wristwatch. DVD extras include biographies of the commentators and "The Hardest Interactive Radiohead Quiz in the World Ever." Overall, I gained more knowledge about the band as a whole, and I felt that the comments offered were valid and worth hearing.

#### Wake Up Screaming: DVD

A Vans Warped Tour Documentary I should say first off that this DVD is not be confused with a Vans Warped Tour Live DVD. This is a documentary about Jason Bayless, Senior Youth Outreach Coordinator for peta2, the Youth Division of the People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals. Though it does contain live performances from many of the bands on the 2005 Warped Tour (Hawthorn Heights, Emery, Strike Anywhere), the copy on the DVD case is very misleading, as is much of the rest of the promotional materials, which definitely play down the animal rights angle. That said, this is an excellent and inspiring documentary about Bayless, a Texas farm boy turned vegan, who has been manning the peta2 booth at Warped Tour since 2002. The documentary monitors the progress of various petitions being signed at the festival, and is very informative as to the issues at hand. Watching this will definitely make you reconsider eating meat, and if it doesn't there is always the bonus feature entitled "Meet your Meat" which I admit I'm still too chicken to watch (no pun intended). -Ruby Soho MVD
