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


Top 5 Monsters We're Thankful Are Fake Happy

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The Deadly Spawn is an indie horror flick from 1982 that managed to garner a loyal following due to its innovative creature effects and intelligent storytelling. It follows the rather simple, suburban lifestyle of a quiet family home that becomes invaded by flesh-devouring alien parasites. The sharp-toothed tadpole-like creatures crash land on earth in a falling meteor and soon take a liking to the taste of human flesh. Pete (Tom DeFranco), a college student majoring in science, and his younger brother, Charlie (Charles George Hildebrandt), a grade-schooler obsessed with horror films and monster make-up, find themselves facing off against the creatures along with a few visiting friends.




The Deadly Spawn itself is a damn good genre flick, with plenty of blood, guts and gruesome creature effects on display. In fact, there's very little criticism that I can level at it. The real problem is this particular release of the film, the so-called "Millennium Edition" as Elite Entertainment calls it. For starters, despite this being the first time The Deadly Spawn has been released in Blu-ray format, the film doesn't even look to be in high-definition. From what I understand, it's technically running in 1080i (notice the "i", boys and girls) but it might as well be standard definition from the looks of things.


The credit sequences are fuzzy and indistinct, and the whole film has a decidedly "air-brushed" look to it, implying that overzealous efforts were made to create an artificially smooth, modern look, thereby completely obliterating the original grain. From what I can tell, no genuine efforts were made to restore or revitalize the film from original stock, and even the audio remains in its original 16-bit mono. I was also disappointed to find the film playing in full screen format, rather than widescreen, but after a little research I found out that no other option is available, as the original stock was shot on 16mm.



The majority of the bonus features (with a few minor exceptions)



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are culled directly from an earlier DVD release of the film by another company, and from what I gather, that earlier DVD release actually manages to play on screen with a higher level of clarity and picture quality, despite having no claims to a high-definition format.

What this all comes down to is a very lazy, lackluster release of a good film that deserves far better. In fact, the regular DVD release from Synapse Films (2004) is probably a far better bet if you're looking for a truly high-quality, definitive release of this picture. I'd recommend buying that one instead, and crossing your fingers that someone other than Elite eventually gains the rights to convert The Deadly Spawn to high-definition in true style.
