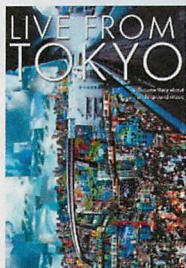
Primal Scream

Live From Tokyo

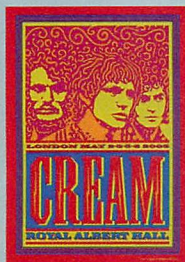

bar for live concert performances. This is a true gem for all music fans. **ML**



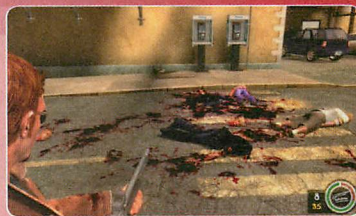
