

Let Ashanti (and her new subway musical *Stuck*) soothe your MTA nightmares

Taking a ride on the New York City subway is the stuff of unimaginable nightmares. For millions of city dwellers, the fantasy begins by boarding a trash-smelling car in anticipation of a shoulder-to-shoulder commute with total strangers. If you're lucky, the worst you'll deal with is an interestingly odored individual clipping their toenails four inches from your face; On the other hand, if you hold a special place in Satan's heart, you'll unwittingly step into an unidentifiable pool of human excrement before your 12-hour workday. It's a scenario ripped from the bowels of hell that's become a part of our daily routine. But, what if you could get trapped on the subway honing your vocal chops with Grammy-winning pop icon Ashanti? Would you suddenly *want* to spend several blissful hours gallivanting about the subterranean abyss?

Stuck — a musical-drama movie the "Happy" and "Foolish" hitmaker stars in and executive-produced — makes that fantasy a reality, and EW's exclusive trailer for the film (above) features the multi-Platinum R&B artist as one of six unlucky strangers (Amy Madigan, Giancarlo Esposito, among others) thrust together when their Manhattan-bound 1 train unexpectedly grinds to a halt deep beneath the skyscrapers of the Big Apple. Their solution? Sing about their problems (Unwanted pregnancy! Misplaced grief! Casual racism!) until salvation arrives.

"We're putting a positive spin on things and looking at the glass half full versus half empty, and we tried to paint a positive picture of all those scary moments," Ashanti — who's also working on a new album, due for release later this year — tells EW of the project. "It shows that we've all gone through situations where we may not be thinking the best while going through situations with other people, dealing with racism, feeling different, or feeling frustrated in the moment."

So, the next time you find yourself rolling your eyes at the woman eating a pungent Chicken Korma sandwich at 7:00 in the morning or the manspreading lunatic barring you from a seat, think of what's possible! Think of the song-and-dance opportunities that'll enhance the trip for everyone! Take a breath, think of *Ashanti*, and sing your heart out!

ENTERTAINMENT WEEKLY: From a conceptual perspective I don't think I've ever heard of a musical about six passengers stuck on a subway. What was your reaction when you first read the script?

ASHANTI: I was like, *wait, what?* It's something very different, which is what drew me to it. It's a little bit scary at first but trying something different and outside the box is what it's all about. I did *The Wiz* before, but the combination of smooshing [music and acting] together is still very new. At first when I was doing lines on set, I was like, *I'm used to this*; When you inject the musical aspect, it felt like I was shooting a video! I was a little nervous at first, but it was a cool experience.

Most people think of using the New York subway as a total nightmare, but this film has a relatively hopeful ending. Miss Ashanti, are you selling us subway propaganda?

[Laughs] No! We're putting a positive spin on things and looking at the glass half full versus half empty, and we tried to paint a positive picture of all those scary moments.... It shows that we've all gone through situations where we may not be thinking the best while going through situations with other people, dealing with racism, feeling different, and feeling frustrated in the moment. This is a bold conversational piece; It's only human that when you have six different people from six different ethnicities and walks of life, that stuff is going to come out — especially in New York City when it's late and it's not your fault and you want to blame someone else. You're going to crack a joke about someone or where they're from because you're mad. Even though we shot this film a few years ago and the message was relevant then, I feel like it's way more relevant now.

I wish I had that perspective on my morning commute, because I was trapped underground for 30 mins with a passionate rage building inside me this morning.

You should've gotten up and started singing and it would've had a different ending.

Do you think our differences could be solved if we all just got stuck on a subway with each other and were forced to talk our issues out?

Fifty percent of me feels like there's a possibility that if we all got stuck it would create a platform for us to express ourselves and our frustrations; The other 50 percent of me feels like what probably would happen in New York City is someone would get shot, because unfortunately real life is that there are some crazy people out there; Not everyone has time to sit and talk with a therapist, so they'll take it out on the next person. I hope this film creates a dialogue and [inspires] people to *think* about something the next time they have a [dangerous] thought.

You grew up close to New York City, right? Do you have any subway nightmare memories?

Yes! I'm a Long Island girl.... I remember one time my mom and I were on the subway because my mom used to work in Manhattan. I was around 11, and I had a cool gold chain on. You know those gates where you walk through them and they spin around? They're tall and almost pointy? This guy pushed me through the gate and snatched my gold chain off my neck. My first reaction, even back then: I threw a glass Snapple bottle at him! We stopped a policeman, and I ended up going to do a lineup to pick one of the guys out.... That's different from the message of this film, but these are things that happen in life. Sometimes you can't control it. But showing different perspectives and saying maybe I should give this a second thought and handle it differently, that's what I hope we created.

With that perspective, how do you think you'd fare in an actual MTA nightmare like this? If your train actually got stuck underground, what would be your first instinct?

I'd be *pissed*. I'd try to get off of there! I'd call the MTA and be like, "Listen, we have to do something immediately!" I don't know if I'd fake labor pains to try to get out of there as soon as possible.

I mean, ok, but if I'm on that train and see that I'm stuck on the subway next to Ashanti, we're singing "Happy" and "Only U" until that damn train moves.

[Laughs]. Could you imagine if we really did get stuck? I'd be looking at you like, Is this guy crazy? He wants me to sing this?

It might make it go faster. Did you guys film on a real subway during working hours?

We did! Toward the end, there was a day of real subway shooting where we'd do the most important cuts instead of renting and blocking on a real subway for the duration of the film.

Were you singing live on the set as they filmed your solo song?

Yeah, I was. You lip-sync some of that, but some of the takes I definitely sang.

Did you help write or produce the solo song?

I definitely helped to write. They came with the idea, but I had to make it a little Ashanti-ish and put a little swag on it.

Which of your own songs would lend itself well to being turned into a full musical?


That's a *very* hard question. You know I've put out a lot of albums, right? [Laughs]. I have a lot of records. I guess off the top of my head, I'm thinking "The Way That I Love You" was very theatrical and the video was a twist and something I hadn't done before. On *Braveheart* there's a song called "Never Should Have" that was very visual. I'd want to see that as a musical. One of those very dramatic records I think would work.

You've released some new music recently. I *love* "Say Less" with Ty Dolla \$ign. Is a new album coming soon?

Absolutely! I'm working with some amazing producers, really cool ideas, and collabs! I'm excited about the next few moves, the year ahead, and releasing new music. It's going to be a lot of fun.

Who are you collaborating with?

I'm working with Metro Boomin! He and I are executive-producing the project together. I'm working with Tory Lanez, Jeremih, and Swae Lee. I'm doing some stuff with Wiz Kid, and there are some talks of doing stuff with Davido, J-Roc, L. T. I've been talking to.... J Balvin, J. White [about] some really cool ideas.



Will we get a single anytime soon?

I'm hoping so. With me, it's timing. There are a lot of things going on and it's important to line everything up as much as you can, but it's also important to not sit and wait on things. Sometimes I have a bad habit of waiting for things to line up perfectly because sometimes that doesn't happen and then you miss out. I'd love to have some new stuff out this summer!

Do you have an album title or concept you're working with?

I do, but I can't tell you yet [Laughs]. And it has a concept and it's really cool. It really tells a story. You really have to get it. I don't even want to put a little bit out there because people are going to be like, what? I'd rather give you the whole, full-course meal instead of just the appetizer, because if you don't taste it right, it might not go down right!

Ashanti reveals new album plans, potential collabs with J Balvin, Swae Lee, more

Ashanti fans have some happy news to celebrate.


The Grammy-winning R&B icon tells EW she's currently working on her first new album in five years, which she hopes to have out by the end of 2019.

"I'm working with some amazing producers, really cool ideas, and collabs!" the 38-year-old star and executive producer of the **new movie** *Stuck* (out April 19) says of the planned follow-up to her 2014 LP *Braveheart*. "I'm excited about the next few moves, the year ahead, and releasing new music. It's going to be a lot of fun."

In addition to overseeing the project's production with mega-producer Metro Boomin, Ashanti says Tory Lanez, Jeremih, and Swae Lee will also appear on the album, while she's discussed potential collaborations with Davido, J-Roc, J Balvin, and Cardi B/Iggy Azalea producer J. White Did It.

As for a release date, Ashanti says her seventh LP still needs more time in the oven.

"With me, it's timing. There are a lot of things going on and it's important to try and line everything up as much as you can, but it's also important to not sit and wait on things. Sometimes I have a bad habit of waiting for things to line up perfectly because sometimes that doesn't happen and then you miss out," she explains, seemingly referencing the six-year gap between 2008's *The Declaration* and *Braveheart*. "But I'd love to have some new stuff out this summer!"



Ashanti, who rose to prominence with smash hits like "Happy" and "Foolish" in 2002, previously teased the forthcoming album with the Ty Dolla \$ign-assisted, DJ Mustard-produced slapper "Say Less" in November 2017, though she hasn't released a single from the studio set since. Still, she promises something "really cool" with a concept that will be worth the wait.

"I can't tell you yet. It has a concept.... it really tells a story [but] you really have to get it. I don't even want to put a little bit out there because people are going to be like, 'what?" she continues of the album's title and thematic narrative. "I'd rather give you the whole, full-course meal instead of just the appetizer, because if you don't taste it right, it might not go down right!"

Steal Singer Ashanti's Fitness Routine





S inging and acting may be what she's known for —but in order to excel at both, Ashanti says it's crucial that she stays fit. "If I want to maintain



longevity with traveling and being on stage, I have to take care of my body," she says. The star also candidly admits that since the camera "puts 10 pounds on," preparing for a tour or an on-screen engagement is another added motivation to get in her gym sessions.

Ashanti, 38, who is currently working on a new EP, will next appear in *Stuck*, an original pop musical that follows six commuters who find themselves on a stalled subway together. The project is playing in theaters nationwide and will release on VOD and DVD later this year. It's a role that the actress says "was something really different" for her. "I felt like the message was really cool and very relevant. And with me being a true New Yorker, this is something that is a possibility of happening in New York," she says, with a laugh.

We caught up with Ashanti on the press tour for her latest film, where she filled us in on her fitness routine.

Her typical routine

When I'm home in NYC, I have a trainer, Raheem. We do weight training, cardio, running. I'm kind of a tomboy and I'm very competitive so I never want him to beat me. Sometimes he has me work on mobility, other times endurance, and then we'll go for strength. I think it's important to mix it up and hit different parts of your body. We'll do the Stairmaster, lots of core work.

I try to get four to five days in a week with my trainer. When I know I'm going for something specific, like preparing for a role, I try to definitely make it five. When I knew I was going down to Trinidad for carnival, for example, we had like two months. So I said, "Look, I have to be in this little itty bitty costume!" We maybe missed a couple of days but I was really strict with that one.

The workout of choice

For a while, I was obsessed with cycling. I would try to do two classes in a day because I would sweat so much and I loved it! Now I'm on a new kick. There is this new thing my trainer had me do the other day and it was so amazing. I don't know the exact name for it but you're in a plank so you're holding your body weight up with one side, your left side for instance. And then you take your right arm and you're pulling a weight towards you. So you're on the ground and you're pulling the weight. And I could feel everything tightening up on the sides, from my shoulder to my toes and I'm just like, "Oh, this is something that's going to be really, really cool if I continue it." I haven't tried to do it without having the machine yet but I'm definitely going to have to figure out how to accomplish that when I'm not home.

Her fitness nemesis

I hate burpees! I cannot stand burpees but they are so good for you. And I remember this goes back all the way to middle school gym class where they would call them squat thrusts.

Staying fit on the road

I usually travel with my jump rope. I definitely try to do stuff when I'm not with my trainer and he's always paying attention to what I am or am not doing though (laughs). So for instance, I had a cheat day last Saturday morning so I had pancakes and he DMed me and he's like, "What is that? Are you doing crunches after?" When I'm not at home, he'll text me a workout and I'll try to get it done. I'll try to do crunches and jump rope and pushups and stuff on my own. I try!

I have another trainer in L.A., Donamatrix, who I work with when I'm there. He's completely different than my trainer in New York. So I feel like I'm in a really good position to have the best of both worlds on either coast.

Not always in the mood

I don't always feel like working out but finishing a gym session is the best feeling. I did that like two weeks ago. I was I so out of it and I was like, "I don't feel like it." We were in New York. It was raining. It was gloomy. It was cold. But I pushed myself and I went and I put it on my Insta stories and I'm laying on the floor in the gym and I was like, "Oh my gosh, I was so dead before I got here. And I'm even more tired now but I'm so proud of myself that I actually did the workout."

I'm really into green juices. I'm glad I got one today! I'm actually drinking one now. And I'll make a plant-based protein smoothie to snack on in between as well. I also like the No Cow bars. The raspberry one is the best.

A primarily plant-based diet and some fabulous cheat days


I'm a pescatarian so I don't eat a lot of meat. I try to stay away from carbs and I know diet is super essential to being healthy and maintaining and trying to stay fit. But I do have two cheat days and I look forward to them every week. I try to make it the weekend for those but sometimes I get tempted during the week. So I'll be like, "OK, I'm going to use Taco Tuesday as my day!"

I do a lot of plant-based—Beyond Burgers and the Beyond Sausage are my favorite right now. I've been eating them every day. I'll do egg whites. I'll do some kind of fish, broccoli, asparagus or cauliflower rice. I'm a big cereal girl. I'll do nondairy yogurt. I'll throw some crab legs in there every now and again. But I've tried to keep it under wraps during the week. Not anything too crazy or too strict but I do try to stay away from the carbs as much as possible.

Cheat day is like pizza, cake, potatoes. It's a little bit of everything. I will definitely has some carbs. If we go out to dinner or something, I might have the garlic bread. Oh my gosh, or the lobster mac and cheese!

"We're still on the path to dropping a joint album," Ashanti added. "I think that should be kind of cool, too."



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

Ashanti Shares Her Last Text With Nipsey Hussle: 'I'm Still in Disbelief' (Exclusive)

Two weeks after Nipsey Hussle's shocking death, R&B star Ashanti is still in "disbelief" about the beloved rapper's passing.

Hussle was shot and killed on March 31 outside his clothing store in South Los Angeles.

"I'm still little bit in disbelief," Ashanti shared while stopping by ET Live on Monday. "Going to the funeral, I think it shocked me a little bit and it became a reality, seeing the casket on the stage. It was like everyone stood back like, 'This really happened,' and it just shows you that life is so short and so precious."

"He's such an amazing person and an amazing spirit and he's done so much," she added. "He had so much more that he was doing."

The "Foolish" singer noted how special it was to see the "overflowing" love from fans following the musician's death and even more significant to see how those who didn't even know him have felt his loss.

"It's so weird, I got a text from one of my friends, and she didn't know him personally at all, and she's like, 'My heart is hurting,'" Ashanti said. "You didn't have to know him personally. He touched people without you knowing the person."

As a close pal of Hussle's, Ashanti reflected on what a great friend he was, recalling how he tried to help her battle a recent illness, which prevented her heading to the studio to work with him. "Nip was always helpful. It's funny because I was looking at some of the last texts that we had, and I was recording at his studio and was like, 'Nip, I don't think I'm gong to make it tonight. I have allergies, I'm sneezing, I got a headache,'" she shared. "He was like, 'Oh I got these herbs that are really good for you! I know where you can get some good stuff!' And he was sending me links and like, 'Sis, I got you, you gotta try this.' And it just made me sad because he was such an amazing spirit. His heart was pure and he was always willing to help and always really positive."

Ashanti added that the last time she and Hussle hung out, she played him some of her new music, and said she will be thinking of his feedback when it comes to picking new songs to release.

She will also continue to remember his legacy and the messages he worked hard to spread amid the music community and beyond.

"One of his messages that was so powerful as an artist [was] owning your masters," she said. "Knowing about ownership. Thinking outside the box. Not holding onto these contracts and signing things that you know nothing about. Trying to make it on your own. Having your own platform, your own voice. Just thinking outside the box and trying to come up with other ways to be an entrepreneur."





LI's Ashanti talks her new movie, 'Stuck'

The Glen Cove singer is also one of the executive producers of the movie about six diverse New Yorkers who interact on a delayed subway train.

The movie "Stuck," about six diverse New Yorkers who interact on a delayed subway train, was held at the station for years before it finally hits theaters on Friday.

But as Ashanti, one of the movie musical's stars and executive producers, declared in her breakout hit with Ja Rule, she is always on time.

"They say everything happens for a reason and timing is everything," said the Glen Cove native.

"You know what's so crazy? I think this is a really good time for the movie ... I think people are becoming cold because we are under so much pressure and we are continuously worrying about how to just survive. This is a message that can let people know on both sides of the fence that it's still OK to talk."

In "Stuck," Ashanti plays Eve, who stands up for herself and some of the others on the train while working through her own problems. That mix of strength and softness, as well as the chance to sing in the film, appealed to her.

"This is something that I hadn't done and I was like, 'Wow, this could be something cool;" she said. "And just reading the script, the reality just set in, as a New Yorker and understanding the subway, this could really happen."

When Ashanti started work on the movie, which also stars Giancarlo Esposito and Amy Madigan, she really felt a connection to Eve, especially because she was working on launching her album "Braveheart" at the same time in 2014. "When we filmed that, there were a couple of things going on in my life, a couple of really wild changes," she said. "I was on my own, with my own label. I remember specifically the day that we shot my scene, where I had to sing my solo in the house, I also had to shoot a video with French Montana. And we were running behind."

Ashanti had already paid for the video shoot and the director, so they were all waiting for her to finish the movie shoot, as well as remove the intricate braids that Eve wears in the movie. "I literally had to take all those braids out of my hair after the shoot and then get it rebraided the next day to shoot again," she said. "It took like 27 hours. I had five girls taking braids out of my hair. It was crazy. But it definitely taught me that when I want something, I have to give it my all and just be determined to get it done, So to be able to say, I shot a video and I shot a film and they're both successful is a really cool feeling."

"Stuck" director Michael Berry said Ashanti was the only actress he approached to play Eve, impressed by the stories she tells in her music and her performance as Dorothy in City Center's 2009 production of "The Wiz."

"I thought she was really truthful and then I met with her and she's a blast," Berry said. "She's nice. She's so fun to make laugh. Her laugh is amazing. And she's a pro. She's just really, really ready to go. She wants to keep things simple, which is my favorite thing. And she really liked this character and she wanted to do it."

Though "Stuck," based on an Off-Broadway musical, was originally expected to be released in 2017, Berry said the delay may work to its advantage.

"Of all times, it's a good time for this movie," he said. "It's a good time for a movie about having compassion for people who are different from you, who have different beliefs and opinions."

Gerard Canonico is "Stuck" on Musicals

From a young age, Gerard Canonico knew he wanted to be in front of a camera. Theater wasn't on his radar, but then he was cast in *Les Misérables* and made his Broadway debut at only ten years old. Since then, Gerard has had a busy career in shows like *Spring Awakening*, *American Idiot*, and *Groundhog Day*. He is currently playing Rich in *Be More Chill* and is starring in the movie musical, *Stuck*.



When did you first become interested in theater and decide to pursue it as a career?

When I was 7 years old I noticed a friend of mine was in an ad for the Gap or Old Navy or something. And I thought to myself "huh, I could do that". So my mom arranged meetings with managers and we found one who started sending me out for auditions. First for print and then for commercials. Within 4 weeks I booked my first national network commercial for Burger King. I turned 8 on that shoot. Then my manager sent me out for the tour of Les Misérables. I had never auditioned for musicals or sung professionally, so it was a bit scary for my parents. I, however, was fearless and I believe I sang "I Just Can't Wait To Be King" for my first audition. They called me back and gave me specific Gavroche material. It went well. Six months later I got a phone call saying they didn't want me on the tour but instead, I was going to replace the current actor on Broadway and make my Broadway debut with Les Misérables in the summer of 1999. Needless to say, I was hooked and I haven't stopped performing in theater since!

Are there any shows that have had a big impact on you?

The shows that started my obsession with the type of musical theater I pursue would be *Footloose* and *Rent*. They showed me that you don't have to stick to convention in order to make good musical theater. You can rock belt in a musical!!! It sort of changed my perspective on what was "allowed".

You list Groundhog Day as your favorite credit, what was it about that show that made it so special to you?

Groundhog Day was quite the experience! When I say "favorite" it's because I can't put all my credits for certain categories in my bio or it'll be hundreds of words long. It's up there as one of the greatest shows I've ever been in. The experience backstage was the polar opposite of the experience onstage. It was kind of brutal backstage and the creative team was very hard on us. We were all character actors, however we were being treated like principal dancers. Very different ways of working. My all time favorite Broadway show that I've gotten to do night after night was American Idiot. I never got tired of doing that show. It was like a rocket exploded from start to finish and you're either on the ride or you'll fall off. It was thrilling.

Stuck is a very different kind of movie musical, can you tell us more about it?

Stuck is a movie about six people of different ethnicities and backgrounds who all get stuck and locked into their 1 train car underground in NYC. Throughout the movie, you get a peek at each of our outside worlds through song. The songs sort of transport us to different times and places in these characters lives. It's as if we take a trip into their brains and memories and the words they are singing become vibrantly alive in front of you and then when the song is over, it's back to the train car. They all grapple with assumptions about each other. Mostly unfair ones. We get to really "see" each character through the journey of the movie. Keeping things interesting in a tight space like that proved to be the biggest challenge but we all made it work!

What was it that drew you to the role?

Well, this was a last minute booking. I wasn't working on much at the time but I just switched agencies. They called me one day and said I have a last minute feature film audition for a musical movie. I said "okay sure". Not expecting anything, I listened to the song and it reminded me of a U2 song and I immediately was like "ohhhhhh I have to sing this in this movie." Then I read the script and I was sold. The character is very misunderstood. He's prejudged. He's made out to be something he's not at all. I feel that we as a society do that to people all the time. I've had it happen to me my whole life. I'm just some punk and I'm probably stealing something or not paying my tab or whatever. I felt immediately connected to that idea. So I auditioned on a Tuesday. Read with my co-star on Wednesday for a call back and by Thursday I was on set. Apparently they had to fire the person they hired originally because he couldn't handle the workload. The director (Michael Berry) begged the producers to let him hire a theater kid cuz we get sh

it done fast. Low and behold, I was making my principal debut in a film in my mid twenties. Four years later and the movie is finally seeing the light of day. I'm so thrilled!

Have you ever been stuck on the subway?





Two weeks after Nipsey Hussle's shocking death, R&B star Ashanti is still in "disbelief" about the beloved rapper's passing.

Hussle was **shot and killed on March 31** outside his clothing store in South Los Angeles.

"I'm still little bit in disbelief," Ashanti shared while stopping by ET Live on Monday. "Going to the funeral, I think it shocked me a little bit and it became a reality, seeing the casket on the stage. It was like everyone stood back like, 'This really happened,' and it just shows you that life is so short and so precious."

"He's such an amazing person and an amazing spirit and he's done so much," she added. "He had so much more that he was doing."

The "Foolish" singer noted how special it was to see the "overflowing" love from fans following the musician's death and even more significant to see how those who didn't even know him have felt his loss.

"It's so weird, I got a text from one of my friends, and she didn't know him personally at all, and she's like, 'My heart is hurting,'" Ashanti said. "You didn't have to know him personally. He touched people without you knowing the person."

As a close pal of Hussle's, Ashanti reflected on what a great friend he was, recalling how he tried to help her battle a recent illness, which prevented her heading to the studio to work with him.

"Nip was always helpful. It's funny because I was looking at some of the last texts that we had, and I was recording at his studio and was like, 'Nip, I don't think I'm gong to make it tonight. I have allergies, I'm sneezing, I got a headache," she shared. "He was like, 'Oh I got these herbs that are really good for you! I know where you can get some good stuff!' And he was sending me links and like, 'Sis, I got you, you gotta try this.' And it just made me sad because he was such an amazing spirit. His heart was pure and he was always willing to help and always really positive."

Ashanti added that the last time she and **Hussle** hung out, she played him some of her new music, and said she will be thinking of his feedback when it comes to picking new songs to release.

She will also continue to remember his legacy and the messages he worked hard to spread amid the music community and beyond.

"One of his messages that was so powerful as an artist [was] owning your masters," she said. "Knowing about ownership. Thinking outside the box. Not holding onto these contracts and signing things that you know nothing about. Trying to make it on your own. Having your own platform, your own voice. Just thinking outside the box and trying to come up with other ways to be an entrepreneur."

Spreading important messages is also something the singer is passionate about, as evidenced by her latest project, *Stuck*. The musical drama centers on six strangers from different backgrounds, who get trapped on a New York subway and must learn to connect through cultural, racial and class boundaries.

"Although we shot the film a little while ago, I think the message is way more prominent now," Ashanti said. "I just think it's important to be kind. You never know what a person is going through, you never know what they've experienced. Having six different people from six different walks of life being stuck and faced with those frustrations and those racial stereotypes and stuff -- it's like a mirror to say, 'Hello? We're all human at the end of the day."

I have allergies, I'm sneezing, I got a headache," she told Entertainment Tonight Live. "He was like, 'Oh I got these herbs that are really good for you! I know where you can get some good stuff! And he was sending me links and like, 'Sis, I got you, you gotta try this.' And it just made me sad because he was such an amazing spirit. His heart was pure and he was always willing to help and always really positive."

The Happy songstress, who attended the father-of-two's funeral on 11 April, added that she was still a "little bit in disbelief" about his untimely death.

According to *Music News*, in an interview with *Entertainment Tonight* she recalled how, when being ill prevented her from heading to the studio to work with Nipsey, he sent her a string of texts full of helpful advice.

"I was recording at his studio and was like, 'Nip, I don't think I'm going to make it tonight. I have allergies, I'm sneezing, I got a headache,'" she told them.

"He was like, 'Oh I got these herbs that are really good for you! I know where you can get some good stuff!' And he was sending me links and like, 'Sis, I got you, you gotta try this.' And it just made me sad because he was such an amazing spirit. His heart was pure and he was always willing to help and always really positive," she continued.

The "Rain On Me" hitmaker attended his funeral on April 11 and revealed she still couldn't believe what happened to him.

"It was like everyone stood back like, 'This really happened,' and it just shows you that life is so short and so precious."

In 2001, Ashanti rose to fame when she collaborated with Ja Rule on the hit song "Always on Time." The single topped the U.S. singles chart and was a worldwide success. In 2002, she released her debut self-titled studio album. Tensions will inevitably rise, lives will be contemplated and... they will break out in song.

That's what Stuck, the new musical drama by Michael Berry, opening Friday in select theaters, sets out to explore. In addition to portraying Eve in the film and serving as an executive producer, Ashanti also co-wrote (along with Riley Thomas, Ben Maughan and Tim Young) and performs on one of the movie's iconic anthems "Make it Better."

Billboard caught up with the R&B star to chat about the project and hear the latest on her upcoming EP, which features an array of exciting collaborations.

What attracted you to Stuck?

The role of Eve. I just think she's really relatable. A lot of females have gone through very similar situations with having to make huge life decisions and feeling alone in the process, and just being very grounded. It's funny. After the film, a lot of people came up to me and were like, "oh my gosh. I loved your character! I feel like I know her. I feel like it was me riding the train" and things like that. So I think that was one of the best things. She was really authentic to herself.

The film is about six different people from six different walks of life being stuck on a subway train in New York City in the dead of summer. And the frustration, the racial tension, and all of these stereotypes come flying out as they're spewing out their frustrations on why they're stuck on this train. It's kind of like a mirror to what's going on in our society. And I think it's just a really important conversational piece to get people to start being real and facing the reality of what it is. We've come a long way, but I just feel like we really have a, a long way to go.

And the film has a musical component to it. How fun was that?

This is what attracted me I think to the film because I'd never done anything like before, just combining -- kind of like with my music -- it was like combining the marriage between hip-hop and R&B, the marriage between a musical and the film, a musical film. So I'd never done anything like that. Obviously I've done films, I've done musicals, but to have the two in one was a really cool experience. And I was a little nervous. I didn't want it to come off corny you know because sometimes it's possible to intertwine the two when and have it seem a little corny. But I think this was done so well and it was integrated so well that you're really moved. And another thing that people were saying is that it touched every emotion – you laugh, you cry, you get upset, you're a little bit confused. So it hits every emotion, which is cool.

Tell us about the inspiration behind "Make it Better."

It was about Eve making the decision to make it better -- just about everything that she's going through. And I wrote obviously on the record and I feel like it was painting a picture of what she was going through in her life. This film reminds me of a musical version of *Crash* -- everyone has like their situation that happens and then it all ties in together at the end. Six people specifically are stuck. So they're all going through their issues on the train. And it's not like other people are around. So the scene happens as Eve is reflecting, sitting on the train.

What do you hope that people take away from the film and hearing this song in it?

I hope that people take away the very important fact that this is a mirror and there are so many things that are going on with politics and the racial issues. I hope that people take away that it really doesn't take a lot to be kind. You never know what someone is going through and if you smile at someone or you wave at someone or maybe you hold the door for someone, that small gesture can completely change a person's outlook on you, outlook on life, outlook on their day. Something small like that can make a huge impact.

And we hear that you are currently working on a new EP. What can you tell us?

Yes. Super excited about the music! Me and Metro Boomin' are doing a project together. We went to the studio on Sunday in LA. I did a Live on my Instagram and we were asking the fans what kind of songs do they want? And it was like a landslide: Ashanti's R&B, 2019 style. So I've worked with a bunch of really cool people. Sean Paul actually pulled up on me that night. We did a record together. Tory Lanez, I've been texting him and we've got some stuff moving on back and forth – just a bunch of different artists and producers and concepts. Swae Lee and I had done some records together but we're going back in to do some more stuff. I've done some stuff with Wizkid. Oh I've been talking to J. White, who just did all of Cardi's records. He had a dope concept!

Stylistically, how is this music going to be different than past Ashanti releases?

I think music just changes in time, sound, sonically, cadence but still at the same time being true to why people fell in love in the beginning. I think that's the formula. But this time it definitely sounds like the fans want vintage R&B. Just classic Ashanti R&B. They want R&B as opposed to other genre music of records. So I'm getting back to my roots with a 2019 spice and edge, and sound just sonically. I feel like this EP is going to be very bold. There are things that I'm talking about that I've never touched before and I'm excited about it. I'm hoping to have something drop in June and it's probably going to be around 7 tracks.

Anything else exciting coming up for you this year?

We're going to be touring. I believe we're going to Australia. There's some stuff in Belgium. So I'm doing some stuff overseas. Hopefully new film stuff coming. I know that there's two projects that are in the works now. And of course, things I can't tell you about yet (laughs).

"Queen!! When are we getting an album?" another fan inquired.

According to *Billboard*, *Stuck* tells the story of six strangers who are trapped on a New York City subway as the train stalls. The musical drama was created by Michael Berry and also stars Amy Madigan and Giancarlo Esposito. According to IMDB, the film was released independently in 2017 and will premiere in theaters on Friday. Ashanti, who co-wrote a song for the film, spoke to *Billboard* about her character, Eve, and her decision to take on a musical film.

"The role of Eve. I just think she's really relatable," Ashanti said during her interview. "A lot of females have gone through very similar situations with having to make huge life decisions and feeling alone in the process, and just being very grounded."

The "Foolish" singer also mentioned that she would be returning to the music scene with a new EP. She told *Billboard* that the EP will be "Ashanti style in 2019." The singer also said the venture will feature artists like Metro Boomin, Sean Paul, Tory Lanez, and Swae Lee of Rae Sremmurd. Ashanti said the changes in the music industry since she came on the scene in 2001 have been something she's had to adjust to when releasing new music.



"I feel like this EP is going to be very bold. There are things that I'm talking about that I've never touched before and I'm excited about it," Ashanti said.

The "Rain on Me" songstress said she expects to release her EP in June and will have seven tracks. In the meantime, the singer is set to go back on tour soon with some overseas performances.

Film Review: 'Stuck'

Six people from radically different backgrounds sing about their experience while trapped in a NYC subway car in this scrappy indie musical.

A stalled New York City subway carriage serves as a toe-tapping musical Petri dish for six socioeconomically diverse souls in the unique stage-to-screen musical adaptation "Stuck." Sharing a stylistic template with its 2016 left-coast cousin "La La Land" (which it predated Off-Broadway by a good four years), the film's 2017 copyright suggests a missed opportunity for momentum that could be made up by the positive word-of-mouth (generated by the film's fest-circuit delay) for a modest achievement that benefits from a lot of heart and not being like anything else out there.

"I bring a measure of grace to the world," says Shakespeare-spouting homeless philosopher Lloyd (Spike Lee regular Giancarlo Esposito, well-known to another generation for his work on "Breaking Bad"), a dishevelled yet dignified Greek chorus who sets the stage in song: "It's a common notion that the universe will shove together people who uniquely offer what the other needs."

With that, the train on which he seems to live grinds to a halt. "A police emergency," says the conductor (Mel Johnson Jr., who played Lloyd in the stage version) before mysteriously and decisively locking the doors at either end of the car. Thus are three men and three women, each with their simmering frustrations, clichéd prejudices, and elusive dreams ... stuck.

There's the strapping Ramon (Mexican star Omar Chaparro) seen dashing from his dishwashing job to make the train on his way to another hard-labor gig, nononsense Eve (singer-actress Ashanti), and seemingly timid academic Sue (vet Amy Madigan, who also appeared in director Michael Berry's fine first feature "Frontera"). Joining them are tense Korean dancer Alicia

("Teen Wolf's" Arden Cho), her geekily half-hearted stalker Caleb (Gerard Canonico, from Broadway's "Be More Chill") and, of course, their derelict enabler, the loquacious Lloyd.

This fine cast talks and sings through a timely, hot-button laundry list of issues that encompass but are not limited to immigration, health insurance, racism, parenthood, social media, and sexual assault: Ramon works three jobs to support a wife and three young daughters, Caleb's an aspiring artist, Eve's newly-pregnant, Sue's lost her son, Alicia's haunted by an attack, and so on.

Films made in close quarters and/or talk-sung in a parallel reality are nothing new: Roman Polanski excels at the former, and Jacques Demy polished the latter (there's even another movie that does both, director Reinhard Hauff's 1996 tube-set German musical "Line 1," also based on a stage show). What Berry and his troupe bring to the table is a lean focus on getting to their points in a New York minute with pithy dialogue, a broad palette of musical influences and a winning confidence.

Cinematographer Luke Geissbuhler, who has shot multiple documentary and fiction projects for Sacha Baron Cohen, Thom Zimny, and others, leads the craft charge by employing a fluid camera that at once emphasizes and expands the claustrophobic set while capturing unguarded character moments. And the much-maligned Metropolitan Transit Authority gets a well-earned shout-out for their access (and sense of humor), which lends the film an authenticity that sells the musical fantasy.

Stage musical creator Riley Thomas has a fleeting cameo as a ballet studio manager, as does co-composer and lyricist Tim Young as Sue's son. Madigan, Cho, Esposito, and Chaparro are listed as associate producers, while the film is "in memory of" production accountant Danita "Misha" Turner, "a ray of positive joy," per producers, who passed away just after filming.

"Oftentimes these connections are neglected or rejected," sings Lloyd early on to complete the couplet, "but every now and then the universe succeeds." So, in its sincere and refreshingly scrappy way, does "Stuck."

Review -

There are many things that can make a bad day and I can tell you that being stuck in a train carriage with a bunch of strangers for an indeterminate amount of time would be very high on that list. With this in mind, I was captivated with the idea of setting a musical in that setting and where you could go with the pressures and opportunity of keeping everyone in that one space. What we get in the final film is a story with two halves, however, unfortunately, they don't quite work together.

So to set the scene, it is a day in New York and disconnected strangers are running around in their day trying to get from one place to another. You have Lloyd (Giancarlo Esposito) a homeless gentleman who is getting ready for the day in the actual train carriage. Alica (Arden Cho) a dancer trying to get home and avoid her stalker Ramon (Omar Chaparro), Caleb (Gerard Canonico) who is running between his many jobs, then Eve (Ashanti) and Sue (Amy Madigan) who are just trying to get home on a difficult day. Fate is a precarious thing at times, and this day as they board the train everything grinds to a halt as a police incident closes the train lines trapping the train in-between stations, and as the carriages are locked there is the realisation that they are trapped and the only thing you can do is sing.

While I don't think parts of the film worked, there were moments where *Stuck* really shines. The first thing is that the cast is amazing, Giancarlo is instantly compelling from the moment he appears on the screen and that continues throughout the film. The concept itself is a really good idea because it is something that everyone can relate to because we have all been stuck with strangers on public transport when it all fell apart. Also at the core, this is a musical, and when it gets into the musical side of things the film comes alive. The cast all have wonderful voices that in the big whole cast numbers it just pops. All of this makes those emotional beats especially towards the end of the film really hit home.

Where the film does not quite work is in the connective tissue in-between the musical numbers. At times it falls flat and at other times borders on the offensive. Now I have not seen the original musical this film is based off so I can't tell you if the following issues are because of the original or the adaptation. At the start, it felt like these awkward encounters were fitting because they were strangers but as the film went on it never progressed from this. Part of the issue is I think that this was filmed a couple of years ago and the world has shifted in that time. There was a sub-plot with a women and a guy that is following her around and even though there is a song about how dangerous it is for women in the city, there is a whole dialogue scene where she is the bad guy for not even giving him a go, like that, is something she needs to do, and it is as difficult to watch as it sounds.

Part of what doesn't quite work is that film is working on playing off a fantastic reality scenario however it tries to be a bit too coy with it. There was this overarching narrative of putting people that needed to meet together because of fate, but this felt less like an integrated part of the film and more of a bookend which diluted the impact. Also from watching it, I could see how the narrative structure could work really well as a play where you have that live audience dynamic to work off, and without it, well it just does not have the same impact.

In the end, so de we recommend *Stuck*? Maybe. If you are a fan of musicals, then this setting shakes things up in a way that I think will really be interesting for you. However, for me, all the connecting stuff of the film just didn't work and that just really limits how much I would recommend it.

WHAT PARENTS NEED TO KNOW

Parents need to know that Stuck is the film adaptation of a stage musical that implores audiences to treat strangers with kindness and compassion. It focuses on six multicultural New Yorkers trapped in a subway car who at first appear to live up to their stereotypes. But once they open up and admit their personal struggles, it eventually becomes clear they're not all that different. Mature themes include homelessness, disability, loss, sexual assault, immigration, poverty, and unwanted pregnancy; the film doesn't get political, but some heated debates feel lifted straight from cable news. Language includes "s--t," "bitch," and "f---ing" but isn't frequent, and the dialogue works around harsher terminology like "abortion" and "rape." It's the same for imagery: Enough is shown to imply the rough stuff being depicted without getting super graphic. For instance, a young woman is brutally assaulted, but viewers only see flashes of three men grabbing her, followed by her reactions in close-up, where she has a bloody nose and lip. One scene includes suggestive dancing during a song about the objectification of women. The film is earnest and clear about its positive message -- to put down our devices and our differences and engage with the world around us -- but it's unlikely to result in a single teen changing habits.

IS IT ANY GOOD?

This modern musical so earnestly sings about Americans' social issues that it's essentially *Sesame Street* for teens and adults. Every topic -- from mental illness to unwanted pregnancy -- has its own song designed to expand our understanding that each person is more than a label. The intention is fantastic, but the obviousness can feel a bit like *SNL's* recurring "High School Theater Show" sketch, in which teens think they're pointing out society's injustices in an avant garde way.

Putting a bunch of extreme personalities into a room and forcing them to interact is a tried-and-true plot trick of the stage that's been employed to great effect in movies like 12 Angry Men and The Breakfast Club. It's often used for the purpose of breaking down prejudice to show people for who they truly are, just like in Stuck. What's new is adding music to it, and Riley Thomas' music is exceptional -- clean, concise, and clear in its messaging. It's all very Free to Be You and Me, but -- unlike that hallmark soundtrack -- it probably won't change anyone's outlook.

A musical set in a stranded New York subway car? Where three women and three men, from very different backgrounds, finally start talking?

It's not the breaking into song which seems unbelievable – I've seen that several times on the Tube in London (when I say seen, it's been through half-closed eyelids, pretending to be asleep). But strangers actually talking to each other? I know, what?

Despite covering death, racism, immigration, homelessness, sexism and more, *Stuck* is remarkably buoyant, and enjoyable (if prone to lecturing and over-simplifying complex issues).

Stuck does try to show that despite the different prejudices of many groups, and different types of privilege – issues which often leave liberals fighting among themselves while the Right sails on regardless – progress can be made.

Using an underground train to bring people together and force them to talk is a good one. Not only are we splitting into even smaller, separate communities above ground, but below the surface it's almost become a joke how much we avert our eyes to avoid contact with fellow commuters.

Now it's phone headphones we use to signal our iceberg-like qualities; it used to be Walkmans. It's always been books and feigned snoozing. So many of us in our own worlds, but not forthright enough to say that we don't want to speak to someone.

In Stuck they do say that though; everyone is pretty forward. Maybe it's an American thing, or maybe it's for the movie. (I've been on the New York subway and I don't remember anyone speaking to me, though I was pretending to be asleep, with headphones in, a book open on my lap and a hotel DO NOT DISTURB sign round my neck.)

Stuck begins with a cacophony of jarring, discordant city sounds, though the noises soon merge into melody. It's a taste of what is to come, as everyone in the carriage gets to shout their frustrations about society at their fellow passengers, and sing their own song (literally).

On the train in the comer is Lloyd (Giancarlo Esposito). He's black, and homeless, always with his cart of possessions, sitting alone as everyone gives him a wide berth. The looks he gets for cleaning himself up on the train are probably the same ones he'd get if he was unkempt.

His sonorous and resonant voice is perfect for train carriage Shakespeare speeches, or would be if people wanted to hear them. Eventually Caleb (Gerard Canonico) gives him 20 dollars to shut up. The 20-something Caleb is a talented graphic artist, and his song brings to life his disabled young superhero Maggie, who appears in the carriage.

But with the subway train stuck at a red light because of an emergency, soon fissures and tensions are appearing.

Caleb has followed Alicia (Arden Cho), a Korean dancer, on to the train – after also turning up at the dance studio where she practices, and at her local coffee shop. It's not a situation the script handles well. He's basically a stalker, and while she does get to tell him what she thinks of him, the message we're given is that he's a misunderstood nice guy and she'll learn to be more accepting. Women are always told to do that, and despite what we later find out about him, his behaviour is very unnerving – an incident in Alicia's life that we see in flashback only makes it worse.

Everyone thinks they're right and everyone is attacking each other, with temporary factions dissolving and reforming in an instant. For a while the carriage is like a pay-it-forward of insults.

Alicia is assumed to be Chinese. She assumes Ramon (Omar Chaparro), an exhausted family man working several jobs to pay for his talented daughter's dance lessons, is an illegal immigrant and rants at him about how they don't pay taxes. Lloyd accuses Sue (Amy Madigan), a middle-aged white professor, of seeing him only as a homeless man. Eve (Ashanti), a young black woman, backs up Sue and calls out Alicia for racism. Sue too jumps to conclusions and assumptions. Alicia berates Caleb for his creepiness. Ramon berates Lloyd for not helping himself to improve his life.

Sue is the most obviously privileged but she's also suffered a huge loss, and she alone has no chance of making her life right. It's a good example of how privilege and terrible events can co-occur, and she's not let her off the hook for her own prejudices. Eve, kind but very candid, wants to avoid the life her mother had bringing up two children. Everyone is running to stand still, trying to make their own lives work against a system stacked against them.

At times *Stuck* is clunky, as individuals take on the mantle of their wider community (or family) and aggressively fight their corner, delivering mini lectures. It's not supposed to be realistic – the situation is by its nature contrived, sometimes reality and imagination blur, and, well, it's a musical – but it can come across as stagy and polemical.

And there's no understanding of how women feel about men invading their personal space when we're trapped, demanding attention that we don't owe them. The resolution of a pregnancy storyline also made me uneasy.

Still, in *Stuck* as in life, music and singing are conduits for oral histories and backstories, and a way to express pain, joy, heartbreak, identity and fun. The singing is exuberant and sometimes captivating, and the different styles of songs really work. Ashanti and Esposito in particular are superb at telling their stories through more than just lines and lyrics.

There are two stand-out musical numbers: Amy Madigan's *Gone*, a powerful and heartbreaking duet with Tim Young who plays her son (and also co-wrote many of the songs); and *Stuck*, an *a cappella* ensemble performance on the train when the lights go out, illuminated by phone screens, the disparate passengers finally a group who've found things in common. The songs include flashbacks across the city, from Ramon's arguments with his wife over his many jobs to Eve's unfaithful boyfriend.

Stuck shows that one to one is always better when trying to find the humanity in other people, or ways relate to them. It's too simplistic a message on which to base solving society's problems, and it avoids structural inequalities that would hold back everyone in that carriage, but it's a start.

Something Stuck doesn't answer though – will we get a soundtrack album for me to listen to on the tube, headphones in, eyes shut, pretending to be asleep?

With the popularity of musical films lately, 2016 gave us 'La La Land.' 2017 was the year of 'The Greatest Showman' and 'A Star is Born' was remade, once again, in 2018, naturally, 2019 needed to release something, too. He was hooked by the fact that people everywhere are angry, especially these days, and he could definitely take that premise and make it work. Not only are people angry but through electronics, human beings are getting more and more distant. So, when these six individuals are, begrudging, made to spend time with one another, even connect, things happen that help each of them... heal, honestly. It'll remind you some of 'Rent' in a way but it's different. Maybe that doesn't make any sense, but the songs feel the same... sound the same. Don't let the fact that it isn't its equal deter you from enjoying it. Nothing can be 'Rent' but 'Rent.' It came along and blew everyone away and got everyone excited about musicals, even if they had never seen one, and 'Stuck' will simply continue to draw interest to the genre. A few things happen at the end of the film that suggests a sequel could result from this effort should they ever get the urge.



The lyrics to the songs are meaningful and reach across lines of culture and race. In fact, the entire film purposefully deals with racism, sexism, class, and grief in several different ways that reflect the current climate rather than attempt to escape it. Some passengers try and help others, but a few arguments happen and are dealt with through gorgeous melodies and verses replacing unnecessary dialogue in songs like 'Gone,' 'Make It Better' and 'Draw You.' I assure you that the ballads will simply delight your ears. The performances, the songs and the incredibly uncommon way to bring us a story such as this, one of harmony and anguish, is worth seeing on the big screen if you can. As I do with most musicals that get released, I'll be buying this soundtrack the moment I can. You might want to do the same.

Stuck (2017) is a film adapted and directed by Michael Berry as his second feature film. It takes the idea that we are all connected – like in the often reviled Oscar-winning Crash (2004) – placed inside a bottle-episode, which is a story where the characters are forced into one location for the majority of the story (often for some arbitrary reason), done through the guise of a musical. In other words, it's pretty fantastic, as each premise asks you to suspend your disbelief that its positive message and strong musical numbers (with an excellent cast) makes for an ambitious and terrific experience.

Stuck was a pleasant surprise that worked for me in multiple ways

Five strangers making their daily commute end up stuck on a New York subway car with Lloyd (Giancarlo Esposito), a homeless man who's taken shelter in it. As the time wears on, the tension rises, forcing the discomfort between the diverse group of individuals to become talking points, and conceived truths are brought to the surface. Through song and intercut flashbacks, the lives of those on the train are revealed to us and the other members on the subway, making everyone question their preconceived notions while finding themselves reflecting inward.

Sue (Amy Madigan), Eve (Ashanti), Alicia (Arden Cho), Ramon (Omar Chaparro), and Caleb (Gerard Canonico) comprise the rest of the characters in the film. The only two who know each other, yet are still technically strangers as they've never spoken, are Caleb and Alicia. It is implied early in the film that Caleb is following Alicia, and his intentions are not initially clear. However, the film will build its narrative with the idea that these individuals have more in common than they may think.



The themes this film tackles are familiar but well executed. A moral ideal like "Don't judge a book by its cover" ring true, as the initial introduction of Lloyd plays out. The other passengers on the train avoid sitting across from him – and when he breaks into song, it seems to only toughen their resolve to completely ignore him. Why? He's clearly crazy, and it's best to not make eye contact and just keep your distance. If you've ever ridden on a New York subway, then you've probably encountered someone similar to Lloyd: a person who is clearly homeless with a cart of some kind, with what one assumes is all their worldly possessions. This movie makes us reflect on our own behaviors towards the people we meet in day-to-day life without passing judgment on us for our actions, but rather encouraging us to reach out and communicate.

Caleb at one point remarks at how poorly our society communicates, despite having so many different ways to do so. The message he is going for initially seems a little on the nose, but it does help put the movie into perspective. Most of the people on the train are going through some very tough situations. However, it seems each of them would rather carry their burdens by themselves rather than asking, trusting, or relying on someone else. It is clearly crushing each individual, and this moment where they find themselves unable to keep moving is indicative of their respective breaking points.

In fact, I think the name of this film has multiple meanings. Sure, the surface answer for the name "Stuck" is that the characters find themselves in that very situation: stuck together in a subway car. However, each character is stuck in their individual situations and must decide how to proceed from this moment, then the next, and then the next...much like we are stuck in our current situation, and we have to decide "how do we go from here?". Of course, the hope is that we can unstick ourselves, but it is our actions and choices that will decide our future positions, and that feeling of being helplessly locked in a room with people of whom we would probably never interact with.

There is a really ambitious sequence in the movie where Caleb gets to discuss his art with Lloyd. The scenes here rely heavily on CG superhero elements. To me, they look pretty decent, considering this is clearly a low-budget indie film. This scene plays a major part later in the narrative, and the emotional catharsis for the audience – so I'm glad Berry didn't decide to cut this from the movie for budgetary reasons. Even if you find the effects to be subpar, the role it plays in Caleb's arc is crucial.

Final thoughts...

I truly loved all the performances in this film. Even the scenes that got a little heavy-handed when the issues of race are brought up in a bit of melodrama were executed very well. The musical performances were strong and enjoyable, plus this kind of musical isn't one I'd seen before. Stuck earns the Must See rating, and I encourage you to seek it out through whatever platform it is available to you.

MOVIE REVIEW: Stuck



STUCK- 4 STARS

The simplest interpretation of this indie film's title is the setting of the characters involved. Six New Yorkers are stuck in an MTA Subway car that has stopped mid-route because of police activity ahead. The establishing views of cinematographer Luke Geissbuhler observe the transition of a sunny metropolitan day above ground into the dingiest and rattling poetic monotony of the underground's noise mixed by supervising sound editor David. F. Van Slyke. Each individual of this sextet is trying to get to their desired places and can't. Life has paused them.

Yet, like the truthful insides of any gathering of unknowns, there's more to Stuck than a mere interval of happenstance, and the swelling urban musical that rises from its collective lungs elevates that fact. The spoken and sung revelations of each character's plight create a clashing cross-sectional dip into America's Melting Pot. These poignant emotions fuel biting social commentary in a way few films, big or small budget and musical or otherwise, have ever succeeded. This hidden gem plays exclusively at the River East, Crestwood, Village Crossing, Rosemont, Streets of Woodfield, Woodridge, and Yorktown AMC locations in the Chicagoland area.

Mine the film's title deeper with synonyms. Behind the public transportation jam, each citizen of this showcase is stuck in their own personal way. Breaking Bad Emmy winner Giancarlo Esposito leads this ensemble as Lloyd, a performance thespian who knows his Shakespeare while lugging all of his belongings around on a cart. He is homeless and, therefore, stranded more than stuck. Lloyd sweetly snarls his soliloquies as he fashions himself as "a measure of grace to the world." Esposito is the king of this patchwork court and brings forth a reeling performance.

The four other folks and synonyms who have found themselves in Lloyd's moving domain are Eve (recording artist and executive producer Ashanti), Ramon (Omar Chaparro, soon to be seen in *Pokemon Detective Pikachu*), Sue (80s mainstay Amy Madigan), Alicia (*Teen Wolf's* Arden Cho), and Caleb (virtual newcomer Gerard Canonico). Ramon is a Hispanic day laborer mired by the exhausting hard work to support his family. Eve is saddled with an unwanted pregnancy on her way to an abortion clinic. Sue is a white woman of some privilege stymied by a familial loss. The final two arrived together. Alicia is a ballet dancer confounded by fears and the fixed attention of Caleb's pursuit of her as an artist.

LESSON #1: EVERY STRANGER HAS A STORY—Both the appealing and the weird among us that either catch our eye or cause a passive glance has something going on underneath the surface impression. Maybe it's kindness. Maybe it's crazy. As a fellow stranger sharing that space, no matter if you engage that inherent value or ignore it, you have to respect the other person.

Stemming from Lloyd's catalyst, unspoken nods and acknowledgments turn into openings for conversation. Their asides and stories play out in song sequences that include external scenes revealing character backgrounds of how each arrived at this place. Unfortunately, not all is civil and peaceful. Our people are quick to label and get cross with each other. Huge assumptions and frustrations boil over before shared empathy, cultural acceptance, collaborative understanding can calm the vocal violence.

LESSON #2: WHEN STRANGERS NEED EACH OTHER—Our subway passengers of *Stuck* are in a place where they have to deal with each other and the situation together. You can argue one moment but then need a favor in the next. Demographics and labels cease to matter. This becomes a test of patience and a shift where random luck morphs into connections of circumstance. Interdependence is one area of many where these characters change from the time they get on the train to when they disembark.

Stuck is the sophomore feature film from writer/director Matthew Berry after his underseen 2014 western Frontera. As quite a switch from a dueling Michael Pena and Ed Harris, this sharp new work adds to his promise as a filmmaker to watch. This single setting film has Chicago roots. Stuck began on the 2008 stage at the La Costa Theatre before migrating to Off-Broadway through the New York Music Theatre Festival of 2012. Its expansion to the big-screen is dexterous and seamless.

Naturally, the music is its core. The impressive songs and compositions stem from original writer/playwright Riley Thomas (*By the Book*) with support from arranger Ben Maughan and Tim Young as the composer and music supervisor. Through choreography from Shannon Lewis, each performer is granted standout opportunities to chant their side. The editing team of Elisa Cohen, Lucy Donaldson, and Jimmy Hill worked with music mixer Chris Arias to merge these layers together quite effectively. You know Ashanti was going to blow her number ("Make it Better") away, but the other cast members really impressive with their own talent, especially Canonico and Cho. When all six are combined as an ensemble for two songs ("Stuck" and "Try"), you're going to have to hold down the proverbial doors from being blown off.

Beyond this artistic commitment and creative blend of genres, the messages of *Stuck* win over. The journey of swirling discomfort, anger, sadness, and confusion that all force camaraderie within these demographic microcosms to become less judgmental people is one very much worth following with our own audience steps. When they sing to each other, they sing to us. What they sing about speaks about all of us. That's powerful stuff.

A stalled New York City subway carriage serves as a toe-tapping musical Petri dish for six socioeconomically diverse souls in the unique stage-to-screen musical adaptation "Stuck." Sharing a stylistic template with its 2016 left-coast cousin "La La Land" (which it predated Off-Broadway by a good four years), the film's 2017 copyright suggests a missed opportunity for momentum that could be made up by the positive word-of-mouth (generated by the film's fest-circuit delay) for a modest achievement that benefits from a lot of heart and not being like anything else out there.

"I bring a measure of grace to the world," says Shakespeare-spouting homeless philosopher Lloyd (Spike Lee regular **Giancarlo Esposito**, well-known to another generation for his work on "Breaking Bad"), a dishevelled yet dignified Greek chorus who sets the stage in song: "It's a common notion that the universe will shove together people who uniquely offer what the other needs."

With that, the train on which he seems to live grinds to a halt. "A police emergency," says the conductor (Mel Johnson Jr., who played Lloyd in the stage version) before mysteriously and decisively locking the doors at either end of the car. Thus are three men and three women, each with their simmering frustrations, clichéd prejudices, and elusive dreams ... stuck.

There's the strapping Ramon (Mexican star Omar Chaparro) seen dashing from his dishwashing job to make the train on his way to another hard-labor gig, no-nonsense Eve (singer-actress **Ashanti**), and seemingly timid academic Sue (vet Amy Madigan, who also appeared in director **Michael Berry**'s fine first feature "Frontera"). Joining them are tense Korean dancer Alicia ("Teen Wolf's" Arden Cho), her geekily half-hearted stalker Caleb (Gerard Canonico, from Broadway's "Be More Chill") and, of course, their derelict enabler, the loquacious Lloyd.

This fine cast talks and sings through a timely, hot-button laundry list of issues that encompass but are not limited to immigration, health insurance, racism, parenthood, social media, and sexual assault: Ramon works three jobs to support a wife and three young daughters, Caleb's an aspiring artist, Eve's newly-pregnant, Sue's lost her son, Alicia's haunted by an attack, and so on.

Films made in close quarters and/or talk-sung in a parallel reality are nothing new: Roman Polanski excels at the former, and Jacques Demy polished the latter (there's even another movie that does both, director Reinhard Hauff's 1996 tube-set German musical "Line 1," also based on a stage show). What Berry and his troupe bring to the table is a lean focus on getting to their points in a New York minute with pithy dialogue, a broad palette of musical influences and a winning confidence.

Cinematographer Luke Geissbuhler, who has shot multiple documentary and fiction projects for Sacha Baron Cohen, Thom Zimny, and others, leads the craft charge by employing a fluid camera that at once emphasizes and expands the claustrophobic set while capturing unguarded character moments. And the much-maligned Metropolitan Transit Authority gets a well-earned shout-out for their access (and sense of humor), which lends the film an authenticity that sells the musical fantasy.

Stage musical creator Riley Thomas has a fleeting cameo as a ballet studio manager, as does co-composer and lyricist Tim Young as Sue's son. Madigan, Cho, Esposito, and Chaparro are listed as associate producers, while the film is "in memory of" production accountant Danita "Misha" Turner, "a ray of positive joy," per producers, who passed away just after filming.

"Oftentimes these connections are neglected or rejected," sings Lloyd early on to complete the couplet, "but every now and then the universe succeeds." So, in its sincere and refreshingly scrappy way, does "Stuck."

He is homeless and, therefore, stranded more than stuck. Lloyd sweetly snarls his soliloquies as he fashions himself as "a measure of grace to the world." Esposito is the king of this patchwork court and brings forth a reeling performance.

The four other folks and synonyms who have found themselves in Lloyd's moving domain are Eve (recording artist and executive producer Ashanti), Ramon (Omar Chaparro, soon to be seen in Pokemon Detective Pikachu), Sue (80s mainstay Amy Madigan), Alicia (Teen Wolf's Arden Cho), and Caleb (virtual newcomer Gerard Canonico). Ramon is a Hispanic day laborer mired by the exhausting hard work to support his family. Eve is saddled with an unwanted pregnancy on her way to an abortion clinic. Sue is a white woman of some privilege stymied by a familial loss. The final two arrived together. Alicia is a ballet dancer confounded by fears and the fixed attention of Caleb's pursuit of her as an artist.

LESSON #1: EVERY STRANGER HAS A STORY—Both the appealing and the weird among us that either catch our eye or cause a passive glance has something going on underneath the surface impression. Maybe it's kindness. Maybe it's crazy. As a fellow stranger sharing that space, no matter if you engage that inherent value or ignore it, you have to respect the other person.

Stemming from Lloyd's catalyst, unspoken nods and acknowledgments turn into openings for conversation. Their asides and stories play out in song sequences that include external scenes revealing character backgrounds of how each arrived at this place. Unfortunately, not all is civil and peaceful. Our people are quick to label and get cross with each other. Huge assumptions and frustrations boil over before shared empathy, cultural acceptance, collaborative understanding can calm the vocal violence.

LESSON #2: WHEN STRANGERS NEED EACH OTHER—Our subway passengers of *Stuck* are in a place where they have to deal with each other and the situation together. You can argue one moment but then need a favor in the next. Demographics and labels cease to matter. This becomes a test of patience and a shift where random luck morphs into connections of circumstance. Interdependence is one area of many where these characters change from the time they get on the train to when they disembark.

Stuck is the sophomore feature film from writer/director Matthew Berry after his underseen 2014 western Frontera. As quite a switch from a dueling Michael Pena and Ed Harris, this sharp new work adds to his promise as a filmmaker to watch. This single setting film has Chicago roots. Stuck began on the 2008 stage at the La Costa Theatre before migrating to Off-Broadway through the New York Music Theatre Festival of 2012. Its expansion to the big-screen is dexterous and seamless.

Naturally, the music is its core. The impressive songs and compositions stem from original writer/playwright Riley Thomas (By the Book) with support from arranger Ben Maughan and Tim Young as the composer and music supervisor. Through choreography from Shannon Lewis, each performer is granted standout opportunities to chant their side. The editing team of Elisa Cohen, Lucy Donaldson, and Jimmy Hill worked with music mixer Chris Arias to merge these layers together quite effectively. You know Ashanti was going to blow her number ("Make it Better") away, but the other cast members really impressive with their own talent, especially Canonico and Cho. When all six are combined as an ensemble for two songs ("Stuck" and "Try"), you're going to have to hold down the proverbial doors from being blown off.

Beyond this artistic commitment and creative blend of genres, the messages of Stuck win over. The journey of swirling discomfort, anger, sadness, and confusion that all force camaraderie within these demographic microcosms to become less judgmental people is one very much worth following with our own audience steps. When they sing to each other, they sing to us. What they sing about speaks about all of us. That's powerful stuff.

Six racially, ethnically and culturally diverse New Yorkers find themselves in the title state on a subway car delayed in a tunnel. They gradually reveal their lives, conflicts, resentments, heartaches and hopes to each other through song in this musical, adapted and directed by Michael Berry from a stage show by Riley Thomas. Arden Cho is a young dancer who has captured the attention of nerdy young comic book artist Gerard Canonico, possibly a stalker. Omar Chaparro is a Latino laborer struggling to support his family and in danger of losing his job if he runs late. Amy Madigan is a bereaved music professor who easily can see what's going on with Ashanti, as the composed but troubled African-American woman across from her.

Presiding over the confessions and clashes of these people is Giancarlo Esposito as Lloyd, a Shakespeare-spouting homeless man who serves as a master of the revels. It's excellent to see the criminally underutilized great actor Esposito in a lead role.

Musical Connections: 'Stuck' hits all the right notes

When one gets stuck with a group of strangers in a confined place—be it an elevator, a subway train or what have you—it is quite common to feel compelled to break out into song. Not just any song but a song that relays your life story and incredibly intimate, seemingly insurmountable obstacles that prevent you from moving forward.

That obviously could not be further from the truth but it is the essential setup of "Stuck."

"Stuck" is an original pop musical film about six commuters who get stuck together on a New York City subway. Through the power of music, they learn about each other's lives and, in turn, have a profound effect on one another. Connecting across lines of race, culture and class in a way that only situations of circumstance or happenstance can create, this will be a day that none of them will ever forget.

The music and songs in the film feature musical styles that are specific to each character—a lyrical and musical extension of their culture, thoughts, story and experience with elements of pop, rap, rock, classical and Motown. Stars include Giancarlo Esposito, Amy Madigan, Omar Chaparro, Arden Cho, Gerard Canonico and musical sensation Ashanti while the film itself was written and directed by Phoenix native Michael Berry

In addition to having made his feature directorial debut a few years ago with "Frontera," starring Ed Harris and Eva Longoria, Berry has appeared on Broadway and in national productions of "Next to Normal," "Les Miserables," "Sunset Boulevard," "The Whos," "Tommy" and "Mamma Mia." Therefore, he knows his way around the musical genre. And it shows.

Because these songs essentially tell stories, you will not likely have a desire to blast them on your car stereo during your daily commute. They are quite catchy but they are more poetic than melodic. That is not a criticism by any means and instead just an attempt to classify "Stuck" in a subgenre different than that of "The Greatest Showman" or "Moulin Rouge." If any comparison is to be made, it would be to "Rent."

You may feel compelled to yell at the characters on the screen as each of them eventually clashes with one another. After all, if they simply kept their mouths shut and waited out the delay then a lot of the "debates" (as one character calls them) would not occur and they would all be on their merry way. But that would not allow for much growth—growth that the universe is happily facilitating.

As the lyrics of the first song in the film state, "It's a common notion that the universe will shove together people who uniquely offer what the other needs. Often these connections are neglected or rejected. But every now and then the universe succeeds."

It's a beautiful thought and one that we should heed if we have any desire to escape our self-imposed prisons.

People change people. "Stuck" demonstrates this concept remarkably well in the easily digestible form of a musical —a musical that does not have all the razzle-dazzle (thank you "Chicago") of its big-budget counterparts but manages to sing quite an affecting story.

Inconvenience turns to opportunity in the musical "Stuck".

In 2008, writer Riley Thomas premiered his musical *Stuck* at the La Costa Theatre in Chicago, Illinois. From there, it moved to off-Broadway in 2012 before being commissioned as a film in 2016. With screenings taking place at festivals as early as April 23rd, 2017, it would be almost two more years to the day before *Stuck* would be released in mainstream theaters. With this knowledge, it's hard not to want to root for Michael Berry's cinematic rendition; however, there is the question of whether a story already seven years older than when it was first produced is still appropriate for audiences? Though there's a place in storytelling to defend *Stuck* as incredibly modern in the way it uses the perspective of the leads against themselves in order for them to grow, there is another perspective which questions whether the execution of this is appropriate. Therein lies the struggle with appreciating *Stuck*. It upholds the male perspective while feeding the notion of female weakness. This fact makes a rather charming, well-crafted film hard to bear by its encore.

On an average day in New York, six passengers find themselves stuck when a police action requires their subway car to hold its position on the track. With the exception of busker Lloyd (Giancarlo Esposito), the other five all have places to be. With no end in sight, the strangers turn their focus on each other, instigating incredible tension as their conflicting perspectives put them at odds. Using song as their means of opening up (it is a musical after all), the six strangers begin to realize they possess more in common than initially believed.

So many musicals opt for fantasy over reality, which *Stuck* does not. Here, the music, like the songs and lyrics by Ben Maughan, Thomas, and Tim Young, channel the reality of the world, seeking to confront it head-on instead of packing it in something sweet or radio-friendly. This means audiences are treated to Esposito as Lloyd's aggrieved "Crazy," a song about what people perceive the train-riding busker to be; Omar Chaparro singing the bittersweet "Mas Que Bastane," in which his character Ramon laments how being late for work translates to no dance class for his daughter; and Arden Cho's performance of "Look," a rage-fueled song detailing her character Alicia's complicated past. These songs are not likely to receive heavy rotation, but that doesn't mean that audiences won't connect with their joy, their sorrow, or their rage.

None of the songs would be as impactful as there are without the performances to match. In many ways, the performances are incredibly minimal. In such a confined space, the actors don't have room to walk, jump, or otherwise move, expect from one end of the car to another, so their ability to convey the journeys their respective characters undergo requires a more internalized performance. None do this better than Esposito. He's an actor whose immense talent is on display in every facet of the performance. With simple changes in his face, Esposito communicates a full range of emotion without a single word. Not to mention, as the train's resident, his role serves as both narrator for the audience and oft-aggrieved passenger, as his fellows look down on him for his appearance and perceived station. This, by the way, is a central element of Stuck - not Esposito, though he is important to the flow of the story - but the notion that the other five assume who Esposito's Lloyd is and what he wants. This matters because the story makes sure to do the same with each passenger at one point or another. None are fully innocent, yet none are as blameworthy for the way they treat the other. The story gives them each a human perspective: faulty, but still culpable for their comments and reactions. Take the way Amy Madigan's (Field of Dreams) portrays Sue, an academic whose every attempt at being helpful is undercut by multiple reductive, and clearly unintentional, backhanded comments. Even as an audience might shake their head at her clumsy assistance, referred to in the film as "white woman bullshit," Madigan ensures that the audience sees her struggle, that the audience sees the intent through sheer physicality, even as the words fail. While the cast as a whole is strong, Chaparro isn't given near enough to do, neither are Cho, Ashanti, or Esposito. Madigan's character and performance, however, create a surprising anchor for the others to revolve around.

Where *Stuck* runs into trouble is the storyline involving Gerard Cononico's Caleb and Cho's Alicia. As the film opens and the audience meets the players in various situations, these two are introduced in the most off-putting way: Alicia dances in a private study, Caleb waits for her to exit and snaps a photo before following her. Once trapped on the train, he attempts to talk to Alicia through the music she's so obviously listening to and refuses to take the hint, even when outwardly stated by Alicia. Of all the plots within *Stuck*, theirs is the one that grinds the whole emotional realism to a screeching halt. Instead of being about the redemptive nature of opening ourselves up to someone else's perspective and, in doing so, finding something of yourself in others, Caleb's story is one of possession, of white male ownership, of "I found something beautiful, therefore I am owed." It's absolutely disgusting and is somehow completely accepted by

the end. The most frustrating aspect of this is that Alicia calls out Caleb when he claims what he's owed and yet she still manages to forgive him. Where the other stories felt completely natural in their conclusions, even as previously unrealized connections the passengers possessed are revealed in a cutesy, somewhat eye-rolling "we're all connected" way, the Caleb-Alicia story concludes in the most male gaze fantasy way possible. Sure, it's intended as sweet, but is wholly unearned and quite repellent.



In spite of itself, *Stuck* is an earnest, grounded tale of strangers from different worlds coming to recognize the humanness, not humanity, we all possess that connect us and make us stronger. Though one storyline does distract, it doesn't bring the film down as a whole. Michael Berry's *Stuck* feels like a stage play, possessing the kind of magic which makes the real feel elevated, even when we're all down in the muck. Gratefully, the cast lead by Esposito possesses the temerity and skill to keep the magic alive for the 90-minute runtime. Audiences may not run out to purchase the soundtrack, but maybe, just maybe, they will take a moment to ponder the perspectives of the people they meet on their way out of the theater. *Stuck* is in select theaters now.

them will either forget.


The **movie** hit theaters on April 19th, 2019, and is coming to VOD soon.

Recently director **Michael Berry** discussed his experiences working on "Stuck" via an exclusive interview.

Directing, films, and NYC subways

Meagan Meehan (MM): How did you get into directing Movies, and how did you get involved with "Stuck"?

Michael Berry (MB): I came to directing through acting. The majority of my training and experience is as an actor. I have been fortunate to do a few really great Broadway shows and work with some amazing directors and actors.

The first film I ever directed was a short that I made with a fellow actor during a National tour of a show we were both traveling with. He knew that I had directed a number of stage-plays and suggested we try to make a short film together. We were performing the show for two weeks in Philly, which was about a two-hour drive from my house that is just outside of NYC. He and I and some of the actors from the show that had agreed to act in the film would jump in a car right after the show, drive out to my house, get up early shoot till 3pm, jump back in the car and drive back in time to do the show that night in Philly.

We cut the short while the tour was in Chicago between shows and late nights. We submitted the short to some film festivals and were surprised when the short film started winning awards.

The way I got involved with "Stuck" was when I was visiting my wife (who is also an actor) at an out of town show she was performing in. One of the other actresses in the show told me about her friend who was looking for a director for his show that was going to be produced at the New York Musical Theater Festival (NYMF) about six people who get stuck together on an NYC subway.

I was immediately interested because to me, it is a perfect storm when people/characters of different backgrounds, beliefs, cultures are forced together through event or happenstance and basically have to figure it out. She put Riley Thomas (writer/composer of the stage musical the film is based on) and I in touch, I read the script and libretto, loved it and we met up at a studio in the city where I went on a rant about how I saw the characters and what I thought the show meant and how I thought we could present it theatrically.

Fortunately, Riley liked my ideas and asked me to come onboard and direct the play. He and I had a great experience collaborating on the show and I kept thinking during rehearsal that it would make a really cool film musical.

MM: How would you describe the tone of "Stuck" and what most appealed to you about the film?

MB: Unexpected humanity found in a harsh and unforgiving place. "Stuck appeals" to me because it is a story of strangers who discover to their surprise, compassion and humanity in people that they have initially summed up at a glance.

People they believe they have nothing in common with and yet they connect. I guess I identified with something of myself in every character. I cared and felt compassion for every one of them, and that made me want to tell their story.

MM: How involved were you in the casting process, and what was it like to work with big stars like Ashanti?

MB: I was fortunate to be very involved with every aspect of casting and worked closely with the Producer and casting director throughout the process. Ashanti is a dream to work with. She is a pro, comes in prepared, is crazy talented and great to hang out with. Fact is, I loved working with my entire cast. I was told to keep my answers succinct so I can't really go into how truly magnificent Giancarlo Esposito is, or how Amy Madigan possesses the beauty, grace, and generosity of a woman yet has the energy of a girl. Or how Omar Chaparro is a brilliant cross between Charlie Chaplain and a bad ass action hero. Or how Gerard Canonico was cast two days before we started production and crushed his character and his song on the first day of shooting. Or how to describe the astonishing delicate beauty of Arden Cho juxtaposed with the smart, pragmatic, tough, and capable kid sister that she has become to me. Yep, I liked working with my cast. Every one of them was a gift.

MM: The film is based and set on the **NYC subway**, so did you secure filming on location and what was the trickiest segment to film?

MB: We filmed on a subway set that was built specifically for "Stuck," and we also spent several days shooting on a real MTA subway. We started on the set which was built to the exact specs of a real subway car, so we learned a lot about what we could and couldn't do, which I think prepared us well for our several days on the real subway. It was actually really fun and effective to shoot on a real subway car and platform and the crew handled all great, but those days to me were hands down the trickiest days of the shoot.

MM: What is your favorite scene and a bit of dialogue in "Stuck" and why?

MB: Hmn.... The Ramon song that Omar sings wrecks me because I am a Dad with three kids, so I relate to that struggle. But I guess if pressed I would say that my favorite moments are when Sue (Amy Madigan) and Lloyd (Giancarlo Esposito) are seated across from each other at the end and the things they say to each other before she gets off the train.

Audiences and future film projects

MM: What do you hope **audiences** get out of "Stuck" and how is this film thematically different from others you've directed?

MB: I hope that audiences will feel and relate to one or all of these characters. I hope they are inspired to remember to choose compassion rather than snap judgment when met with people that they believe are different from them. Although my previous film "Frontera" was a border drama set between Mexico and Arizona with horses and vast exteriors. Even though no one sings, "Frontera" is a story about people finding humanity and compassion in others who are different from them and come from a different culture. So, I suppose thematically, the two films are more consistent than they would appear at a glance...

MM: What are the most rewarding things about being a movie director and what other **film projects** are coming up for you in 2019?

MB: Most rewarding thing about being a director to me is that I get to be a storyteller. I will never take that part for granted. My current project is titled "The Shadow Of Freedom." It is based on the true story of a man named Tchicaya Missamou. Tchicaya was born in the Congo and was forced to be a child soldier but later escaped the Congo and found his way into America as an undocumented immigrant. Tchicaya joined the United States Marines and fought for America in Iraq and was then granted his US citizenship. Immediately after with new US passport in hand, Tchicaya returned to the Congo with the intent of rescuing his ill mother. He was arrested as a "traitor" as soon as he arrived, beaten and shot. He finds a way to contact his Marine squad and...You will have to hope that I get the movie made and come and see it find out what happens after that.... LOL.
