Anyone who loves music, and loves shopping for records, will feel a connection to this movie. Ok, so some of the people they interview veer into High Fidelity territory at times, but that's the joy of these record stores, people who are truly dedicated to music. Anyone who is a record nerd has to appreciate that slightly pretentious "we're better than mainstream music fans" feel to the content; you've got to be a little like that to want to collect records in the first place. A lot of what is on show here won't be particularly new or revelatory to those who have knowledge of the subject already. A lot of very familiar ground is tread, such as the record companies' crusade against Napster. This could be the main downfall of the film, it'll only truly excite those who already know the story being told. It's still very much worth a watch, but it's a shame a wider audience probably won't be exposed to it.

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
