As we hit the tail end of the last long weekend of the summer, you may have a case of the blues. Thank goodness another "Music Movie Mondays" has rolled around to offer up a potential cure. If it is a case of the blues that you do have, the only known cure for that is even more blues. Today we look at the first twenty years of one of the most important and influential blues labels in the world. Get ready to stomp your feet for "Blues And The Alligator: The first Twenty years of Alligator Records".

Alligator Records was founded in Chicago Illinois in 1971 by Bruce Iglauer who moved to the city from Cincinnatti where he had been attending college and dropped out simply because he wanted to be closer to his favorite Blues artists. Bruce fell in love with the Blues during the 1960's as he attended folk music festivals. This film tracks the roots of the blues and the reasons for its genesis in the city of Chicago, we not only meet contemporary Blues artists like Kenny Neal and Lucky Peterson but also some great moments with legends of the past like Koko Taylor and Sonny Boy Williamson to round out

Rating for Blues And The Alligator:

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Forty years later, Alligator Records is still alive and kicking so we need not worry about the fate of the blues. This film was produced in 1991 so some of these artists in the film have actually passed away (Koko Taylor passed away in 2009), but it does give a brief yet interesting tale of the birth of the label. They hit the major bullet points, but as it was intercut with performance footage from various artists and sit down interviews it didn't elevate beyond a promotional piece for the label and it all felt a kind of rushed, it was more a teaser for the music than anything else.

The music in "Blues And The Alligator" raises this film into the acceptable range and is a decent yet dated primer for anyone looking to expand their knowledge of the blues.
