BASS IS DEEP

What music are you currently grooving to?

My son introduced me to Earth's The Bees Made Honey In The Lion's Skull and I really love that – it's very simple, and moving. And Bowie's The Next Day, that was inspirational. But I've been making a record and writing arrangements for a tour, so my listening has been quite limited.

What, if push comes to shove, is your all-time favourite album?

Impossible! I'll say **Dylan**'s Blonde On Blonde, I dunno why - the joyousness? The rebellion? It turns me on the most as soon as I put it on.

What was the first record you ever bought? And where did you buy it?

The Golden Striker by The Modern Jazz Quartet [from The MJQ Plays One Never Knows, 1958], from a record shop on Renfrew Street [Glasgow] - I was 16 and studying classical music. It was controlled and beautiful, and it touched me. Percy Heath on bass - fabulous sounds!

Which musician, other than yourself, have you ever wanted to be?

I'm still trying to become myself. Or, Brahms and Liszt... actually I don't want to be my heroes - Mingus, Duke Ellington. If I was them I wouldn't be able to hear them.

What do you sing in the shower?

That's my day off. And I couldn't afford myself, so, just water gushing.

What is your favourite Saturday night record?

For a knees-up - Otis Rush's Mourning In The Morning. Joyous, you can't not dance to it, and prophetic of the morning after, possibly.

And your Sunday morning record? If I'm feeling meditative, I'll play one of many ragas by Ustad Bismillah Khan, who plays the shehnai, a double-reeded wind instrument. If I had a hangover, though I don't drink, anything by Little Walter.

For a while, Emmylou Harris. I was just smitten by the lovely '70s country folk/Laurel Canyon aesthetic and wanted to be the female equivalent of a beard rocker. But my hair isn't good enough. And for another period I wanted to be David Bowie, not for the look so much as for his vocals and his theatrical expression.

What do you sing in the shower?

Whatever of my own stuff I need to practise! Or kids tunes with my son, in the bath.

What is your favourite Saturday night record?

Titanic: Music As Heard On The Fateful Voyage by lan

Whitcomb. Just a good collection of beautiful music that was played as the ship sank.

And your Sunday morning record?

Trojan Records' rocksteady and dub compilations. Just feels good. I thought for years I had an allergy to

What music are you currently grooving to?

Queens Of The Stone Age and a bunch of John Prine records I'm revisiting. I like Queens partly because, although they're original, they remind me of Talking Heads and Devo, two of my favourite bands.

What, if push comes to shove, is your all-time favourite album?

It would probably have to be Ziggy Stardust. When it came out I was blown away Bowie's lyrics weren't the best, but his sense of theatre, Mick Ronson's attack and the album's musical coherence made it a record that I buy most frequently.

What was the first record you ever bought? And where did you buy it?

Rock Around The Clock by Bill Haley at a shop specialising in jazz across from St Leonard's Church, Streatham. The owner was contemptuous of youths who bought such stuff but made more money from us, I suspect, than jazz customers.

Which musician have you ever wanted to be? Living in Austin I'm surrounde

for their talent. I suppose it'd have to be Dylan for his sheer musicality as well as his lyrical genius. Because I've had to give up guitar, due to neuropathy, I'm now playing and composing on harmonica, so Sonny Terry's who I'd currently want to be, I guess!

What do you sing in the shower?

American Songbook. **Noël** Coward. Woody Guthrie. Kris Kristofferson. Old music hall songs. The occasional snatch of opera.

What is your favourite Saturday night record? Born To Run. E Street Band

does it for me most of the time. The Blockheads are great, too.

And your Sunday morning record?

Best Of The Eagles. Helps me get into gear. I also have Monday morning LPs, especially if I'm beginning a new story: **Grateful Dead**'s American Beauty and Workingman's Dead I'm not sure I could start
