 Arena Rock



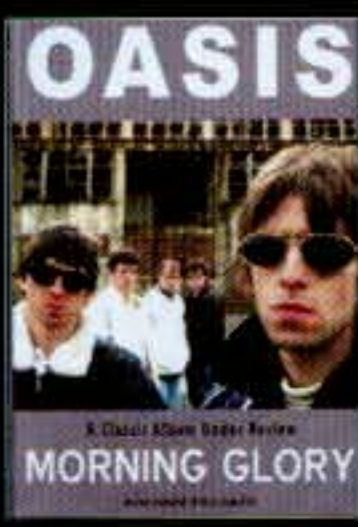

Oasis, *Morning Glory*: A Classic Album Under Review

This DVD is a documentary which takes a critical look at what some may argue is the preeminent Brit Pop album, and certainly the album that cemented Oasis' place in rock history, (*What's The Story?*) *Morning Glory*. Clocking in at just over an hour, the DVD splices together concert footage, radio and television interviews, as well as interviews with rock critics such as Paul Lester (former editor of Uncut), Pat Gilbert (former editor of Mojo), local Manchester DJ Justin Moorehouse, and biographer Paolo Hewitt, to name a few. Each track on this classic album is dissected, and those that are interviewed give what seem to be true and honest opinions of each track. Sometimes the focus briefly shifts away from the band, but as you continue it becomes apparent that it only serves to provide more of the back story. And while casual fans may find the disc boring, both Brit Poppers and die hard Oasis fans will certainly find it informative.
