Three DVD's faithfully capture some of the key music of the 60s and are worth searching out. The Pink Floyd and Syd Barrett Story (Zeit Media) is a special-edition two-DVD box in 5.1 Surround Sound. Disc one is the documentary that traces Barrett's brief time with Pink Floyd. Disc two features the complete unedited interviews with all four members of Pink Floyd and new live performances of Barrett songs by Graham Coxon of Blur and Robyn Hitchcock. The Rolling Stones Under Review 1967-1969 (Chrome Dreams) is a Limited Collector's Edition DVD of one of the most tumultuous periods of the Stone's career. The 90-minute documentary is augmented with many extras. A Night At The Family Dog (Eagle) was a televison show taped in February of 1970 at the seminal Family Dog in San Francisco, which was produced by jazz critic Ralph J. Gleason, who, along with Jann Wenner, co-founded Rolling Stone magazine. The concert consists of powerhouse performances by The Grateful Dead, The Jefferson Airplane and Santana, along with a final jam by members of all three bands.
