cut Ghostland by 25 minutes which means a longer version could still be out there, but is not on this disc.

At the Heart of the Film's Music is a half hour featurette on the creation of Ghostland's score with Laugier and composers Georges Boukoff, Anthony D'amario and Ed Rig. Boukoff describes (from behind his grand piano) how he composed and modulated the score with Pascal's guidance. The music was then refined and remastered by the electrical wizardry of D'amario and Rigg; interviewed from their studio, they discuss how they went about reverberating notes to sync with the action on screen.

The disc also contains a trailer and standard junket-like interviews with cast members Crystal Reed, Emilia Jones and Pascal, who discuss the production and what it was like working with each other.

THE CHANGELING

THE FILM: The Changeling is one of the most unnerving supernatural horror films that I've had the pleasure of watching. Directed by Peter Medak, the film follows John Russell, a music composer who relocates after a freak automobile accident claims the lives of his wife and daughter. Consumed by his own grief he becomes convinced that his new home is haunted by the spirit of a child and that discovery sets off a series of events that will uncover decades of deceit.

Right from the start its clear that this film is special and it comes as no surprise that The Changeling has cemented its place as a favourite for so many genre fans.

In it, Medak does a superb job to build suspense and genuine fear in his audience. Here scares are not achieved through sudden jump scares but through a steady sense of dread achieved through stunning cinematography, superb acting and a keen attention to detail.

In the lead role, George C. Scott is simply marvellous. As John Russell, Scott's performance perfectly captures the inner turmoil of his character making every ounce of his grief feel authentic. In fact, the entire cast is equally as fantastic and do a superb job to make their characters credible. Everyone hits their mark beautifully which really helps sell the dramatic and terrifying elements flawlessly.

The term masterpiece is thrown around all over the place but there's literally no other way to describe The Changeling. It's masterful in what it tries to do and succeeds in doing so with gusto. Even the most simple of scares found within the world of The Changeling is extremely effective and a wheelchair or a glass shattering have never been so terrifying.

Overall, The Changeling is without doubt one of the best supernatural chillers out there to be seen. The way it approaches horror may not suit most audiences but for those with a penchant for good old-fashioned horror, there are many nightmares to be had after viewing this terrifying classic.

On reflection, I was very happy with the extras available on the disc. The contents were intriguing to watch and as a whole

they make the purchase of the film even more worth while regardless if you are a long-time fan or curious to know more about how the film came to be.

THE SONG OF SOLOMAN

THE FILM: Stephen Biro's latest offering The Song of Soloman is the latest instalment of the infamous Guinea Pig series which is infamous for its use of violence and gore. Harnessing the ferocity of The Exorcist and the shocking nature of The Omen, The Song of Soloman stars Jessica Cameron as a young woman who finds herself possessed by Satan whilst wave after wave of priests are sent to exorcise the unholy spirit inhabiting her body.

As with most Guinea Pig offerings, The Song of Soloman knows how to pack a punch and churn the stomach of its audience. In the director's seat, Biro harnesses some very unsettling imagery and slowly begins to build a suffocating sense of dread which rarely lets up thanks in part to a stellar performance from Jessica Cameron. Right from the outset audiences are pushed to the edge of their seat and it is from that moment that Biro holds his audience in a vice-tight grip to set a very tense and uneasy atmosphere that stays true right through until the end credits begin their crawl.


Although The Song of Soloman might know exactly what it takes to keep audiences invested, it is ultimately let down by its supporting cast members whose



performances feel forced and out of place against Jessica Cameron's performance. In the lead role of Mary, Cameron delivers a solid performance which is ultimately terrifying and goes a long way to carry the film through its more dull moments. That said, gorehounds need not worry as Biro's efforts harness plenty of visual effects that will test even the strongest of stomachs out there.

Overall, I was left impressed by what The Song of Soloman has to offer audiences even though it offers nothing new to other possession films that came before it. It doesn't break any new ground nor can it stand shoulder to shoulder with the greats that came before it. However, the film does enough of its own work to keep audiences invested and it is for this reason why I urge you to seek it out.


BRAM STOKER'S SHADOWBUILDER

THE FILM: Based on the short story by Bram Stoker, Shadowbuilder is directed by Jamie Dixon and tells the story of an evil archbishop who summons a demon to destroy the world. However, for the creature to unleash its evil on the world, it must hunt and find an innocent soul of one particular child to sacrifice. What happens next is a race against time for Michael Rooker's troubled priest to save the day.

Embodying everything that a 90s straight to video horror should be, Director Jamie Dixon's feature debut takes his audience on a ride packed to the brim with dodgy CGI effects, over the top performances and lashings of questionable gore. Although Dixon's direction favours style over any attempt to build tension, there's still plenty of fun to be had here if you're able to switch off and enjoy some mindless cheese.

Like any good horror film audiences should have two things, a hero and a villain and in this film the balance is disappointingly uneven. In the hero's corner we have Michael Rooker as Jacob Vassey, the gun toting priest. In the role Rooker is every bit as crazy as he is determined to stop the evil at all costs. His performance echos the same intensity as Donald Pleasance had in Halloween but is far too over the top by the time the third act comes around. Playing opposite Rooker as the films big bad is Andrew Jackson who stars as the Shadow Demon. As an actor Andrew Jackson does perfectly fine to bring the demon to life but the effects used to convey his powers leaves a lot to be desired.

Starring opposite Rooker and Jackson is a very young Kevin Zegers. As a child actor, Zeger actually steals the show delivering a strong stand-out performance as the kid caught up in the middle of a fight between good and evil. In the role, Zeger



is fantastic and goes above and beyond to create a character who is genuinely interesting to watch. As for the rest of the cast, which is largely made of unknown actors, there isn't much to write about as they are easily forgettable. That said, there's a very interesting appearance from Tony Todd which caught me by surprise.

Beyond that, Shadowbuilder is a fun but flawed 90s horror. It's effects have not aged well and look somewhat silly on screen which had a direct impact on my enjoyment of the film. Thankfully, Rooker and Zegers' performances are able to carry audiences past the more distracting moments of the film. So, if like me, you have a penchant for 90s horror then you should certainly check this one out!

Rounding up the extras on the disc are the promotional material of the film including the theatrical trailer which is interesting to see how he film was marketed to horror fans. All in all, a very solid collection of extras that will make the purchase of the film worth your while.
