

career show both his prolific capacity and the high respect his fellow musicians and the recording industry had for his talents and reliability. Even Charlie Parker expressed his enthusiasm to Brownie after hearing him play. "To me, the name of Clifford Brown will always remain synonymous with the very essence of musical and moral maturity", wrote Quincy Jones in Down Beat magazine in 1956, the week after Brown died in a car accident at the age of twenty-five. "This name", continued Jones, "will stand as a symbol of the ideals every young jazz musician should strive to attain. This name also represents a musician who had

intelligent understanding and awareness of social, moral, and economic problems which constantly confuse the jazz musician,
