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

There are some groups whose studio albums never quite managed to capture or convey the essence and chemistry of the music. Mid-70s jazz-rockers, Isotope, certainly fall into this category. Their self-titled debut album from 1974 suffered from a muted boxy feel, and though their sonics were vastly improved on the follow-up records, *Illusion*, and their final cut, *Deep End* (1975), they still lacked the snap and crackle that was so evident in concert. Whilst *Isotope At The BBC* (Hux, 2004) was a move in the right direction, it's only now with Cuneiform's excellent *Golden Section* that we have something approaching the definitive account of this criminally under-rated
