Road To Rouen is a folk-filled affair complete with plenty of acoustic guitar, horns and Lennon-esque melodies. THE WILLOWZ Talking In Circles (Sympathy For The Record Industry)






MARC BOLAN/T.REX Born To Boogie (Sanctuary/EMI)




LAMB OF GOD Killadelphia
