life after GbV

Having retired his 20-year vehicle **Guided by Voices**, Dayton, OH's **Robert Pollard** has resumed his prolific career. January 24 kicks off his post-GbV, solo-only phase with *From a Compound Eye* on Merge Records. It's a sprawling, unpredictable CD that's so chock full of ideas – a double album on vinyl – it's almost bewildering.

Asked the inevitable question about how he approached this da-capo new beginning, it turns out Pollard went forward and backward. "I wrote 11 or 12 new songs; the rest are old songs I found going through my cassettes since the mid-'70s," he tells ICE. "I usually brainstorm ideas onto a cassette, pick 15 or 20 and go back and work on them. But in the process of going through these older cassettes, I found ideas that to me now are better than the ones I used then.

"And that's also a reason I broke up GbV, because of this record," he continues. "I came up with these songs, and said, 'This record is too good to be on [his low-key offshoot series] Faded Captain, this is a good place to start my post-GbV career.' I'm going to start working with new people, is the main thing. When you're in a band, it's like a marriage. On tour you're with them 24 hours a day. And you're not allowed to [play] around with others – well, they'll let you, but they won't be happy about it."

Compound Eye is principally just Pollard (and his guitar) playing with later GbV producer **Todd Tobias**. And the pair has already finished a follow-up, called *Normal Happiness*. By way of preview, Pollard exclaims, "It's the poppiest thing I've ever done. It's all new stuff, 16 two-minute pop songs, and Todd's guitar work on it is fantastic. This is painless, working with him. I make him work harder than I do. I feel like my job is finished when I write the songs. I'm into a relaxed performance."


So what "others" was he referring to? "I'm assembling a band to tour," he says. "I have [veteran guitarist] **Tommy Keene**, [**Superchunk** drummer] **Jon Wurster**, [ex-**Verbow** bassist] **Jason Narducy** and another guy. We do 19 dates, starting January 26. Only the U.S this time." Why so few dates? "I'm getting older [48] so I find myself like an aging athlete with nagging injuries. Six or seven hours a day in a van kills your back. So I think three or four shows at a time is all I can handle."

But more time off the highways means more releases (beyond the three new GbV products mentioned last month: a final live DVD, outtakes box set and *Propeller* reissue). "I have a lot of collaboration projects," Pollard explains. "One with my old bassist, **Chris Slusarenko**, one with Tommy, called the **Keene Brothers**, and another **Circus Devils** album with Todd."

For a man who's moved six times in Dayton since 1998, shlepping 3,000-4,000 vinyl albums each time ("That may be why my back hurts!"), maybe Pollard should just live in a recording studio.

Recorded April 27, 2003 in Digital 5.1 Surround Sound, the 32song London' concert is augmented by interviews with founding members Pete Shelley and Steve Diggle, tour footage and memorabilia ■ Also due that day on MVD is the Small Faces' Under Review, live and studio footage of the greatest '60s mod band this side of The Who ■ Sub Pop never sleeps; see The Elected's (singer/songwriter Blake Sennett of Rilo Kiley) new Sun, Sun, Sun, out January 24, as well as multi-instrumentalist psych-folk troubadour Kelley Stoltz's Below the Branches (February 7) ■ Likewise, Drag City is always busy, and January 24 it'll unleash the debut of a brand new band, Pearls & Brass' The Indian Tower. It's recorded by Tim Green of the F***ing Champs ■ And, as long as we're in Chicago, let's mention the EP by the Windy City's Catfish Heaven, Please Come Back. It's a seven-song re-release on Secretly Canadian, out

January 24, prior to a full-length coming this spring ■ Mute is giving us five more remastered **Can** albums in March. But for now look for the German group's January 24 double-DVD re-release of *The Can DVD*, with a documentary, concert footage, notes, solo recordings, etc ■ Your humble *ICE* columnist appears in it (interviewed holding his cat, no less), so check out *The Shield Around the K*, the documentary about Olympia, WA label K Records – out on DVD on Blank Stare January 24. Meow. ■

They may not be heading for rehab, but Firewater will be the last drink Tha Alkaholiks are toasting together. The L.A. party rappers are sobering up and calling it quits after the Waxploitation/Koch Records release of their fifth album on January 24, though 'Liks Tash, E-Swift and J-Ro will still get liquefied with a final tour and have left the bar door open to possible future one-off collaborations. Firewater's drinking buddies include producers Danger Mouse (on "Chaos") and Evidence from Dilated Peoples ("Handle It") ■ Twentieth-century turn-on: To some, Ian Whitcomb's a rock 'n' roll footnote, known primarily for 1965's frantic "You Turn Me On." But, for the last few decades, the pianist/ukulelist has carved out a career performing Tin Pan Alley items from the 'teens, '20s and '30s (as well as composing film scores). Just out on ITW Industries are two compilations, Words and Music (1967-2005) and Old Chestnuts & Rare Treats, available at retail and at ianwhitcomb.com. In addition, a 35-clip DVD, lan Whitcomb on TV (1965-1986), gathers performances from Shindig, the Tonight Show and other programs.
