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
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Butterfly Ball by: Glover, Roger

A very interesting document made available by the folks at MVD. Very much set in it's era (the early seventies), we get to watch and hear one of those art rock shows that mixed rock music with classical, theater and other forms of art.

Watching BUTTERFLY BALL I cannot help myself in making references to **Rick Wakeman**'s Journey to the Center of the Earth, **The Who**'s Tommy and even **ELP**'s Works symphonic tour. Sure, like these, BUTTERFLY BALL looks and sounds dated and perhaps a little bit naive and pretentious. Then again, the early seventies were a no limits period and I am somewhat sad that today artists don't seem to be as ambitious (this because of the \$ side of the business).

BUTTERFLY BALL is a very interesting document. Very well filmed and taped, you get the live performance in it's entirety. For fans of **Deep Purple** and early seventies art rock this is a gem indeed.
