


OBEY: SUPPLY & DEMAND THE ART OF SHEPARD FAIREY

His camera follows the lives of five graf artists: Kofie, Trixter, Clae, Axis and Tyler as they struggle to walk that fine line between tradition and "getting paid." Focusing mainly on these Cali agents, you gain an understanding of their innate ability and desire to create art—even if there are those, mainly city officials, who deem their

choice of creative expression as destructive. The documentary also shows the progression of the artists as they plan and execute a way to turn their art into a business without losing merit. But most of all, *Rock Fresh* is honest. The subjects of the film are real and they allow you into their lives, as they are everyday. 
