

accompanying soundtrack, a musical score, a soundscape. You couldn't go in and pluck out a song, but as an entire piece it is quite intriguing. It goes through high and low points, soothing strings, to odd techno clangs, screechy guitars, to pianos. Each segment of film taking on a new sound, but still incorporating a sense of rhythm and development as it goes through it's stages.

The film has a very varied look, the source materials are from wildly different quality levels. None of it is all that good looking. There is grain, spots, marks, nothing was cleaned up. It sort of adds to the overall tone. Everything is in a ratio of 1.33:1, which appears to be the proper ratio.

Sound is presented in Dolby Digital 5.1 and it sounds quite good. It is not the best track I have heard, but it serves Jonny Greenwood's music well.

There are even some extras here. First up is the films trailer, which is nice to have. There is also an early short from Pummell, called Blinded by the Light, it appears to be a rumination on blindness and the compensation taken by the other senses. It is an interesting piece. There is an interview segment with the director on the development of the concept. Finally there is a commentary track with Simon Pummull, Jonny Greenwood, and an unnamed moderator, I had to guess at the participants as they were not identified. The track is rather dry, questions about getting the material and recording the music,


with long gaps in between, I lost interest about halfway through.

I do respect him for attempting something quite as experimental as this, it seemed to be influenced by the *-Qatsi* series of films.
