Satellite is the premier progressive rock band from Poland. Unlike a Dream Theater or a Fates Warning, however, Satellite do not utilize a lot of metal elements in their music. With Satellite, instead of a Rush influence you'll hear more of a Marillion, King Crimson, or early Genesis-feel that blends in nicely with their AOR friendly sound. Satellite's *Into The Night* suffers an inability to make their point within the confines of a 5-6 minute song. Don't get me wrong. Satellite are not alone; this plagues most of the subgenre. The inability to make that statement and drive it home allows the song to stick around much too long and loses the listener, which is a shame because this is a highly-skilled band. There's just too many monotonous interludes, and the typical *look at me* wankery. That said, *Into The Night* features great production, and the songwriting isn't at all bad either. The standout track on *Into The Night* is "Downtown Skyline" where you see the band shine in a song that's kept to a 6-minute-plus maximum.

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
