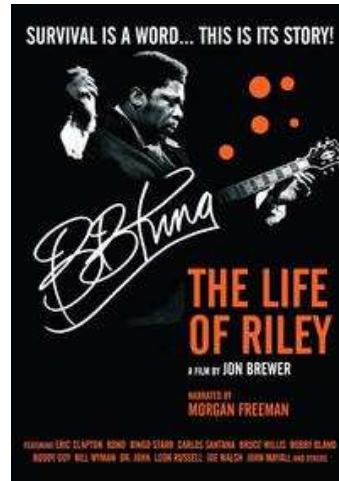
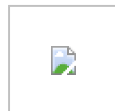
B. B. King

The Life of Riley DVD

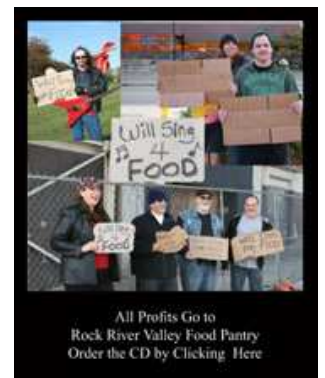
