Great guitarist knows no musical boundaries

THIS diminutive Canadian guitar virtuoso has become famous for his two-handed lap-tapping technique but, for most of this performance at the Cask, he restricted himself to the traditional guitar position used by mere quitar mortals.

Yet he still managed to produce the sound of a several musicians from just one instru-

Seated on the small stage, head bowed in concentration, he strikes both the strings and body of the guitar to combine melody, accompaniment and percussion simultaneously.

Like many great artists his music knows no boundaries, each solo somehow combining the best of pop, folk, flamenco, jazz and classical music in an

entrancing mix.

At times his guitar sounded remarkably like a kora - the 21string lute played extensively in West Africa. At others it resembled a classical ensemble.

The audience at the Cask were clearly entranced by his playing,

somehow remaining completely silent throughout each number erupting into rowdy applause and wonderment at the conclusion of each.

With every seat taken long before the performance started, late-comers had to strain to catch a glimpse of the artist at work but none seemed disappointed or frustrated.

Perhaps the loudest applause followed an amazing encore in which he reverted to the lap-tap-ping technique that has made him so famous.

Laying the guitar across his lap he treated us all to a truly virtuosic performance in which the sounds of the guitar seemed to build and build, his fingers striking nearly every string and body part to produce a resounding finale reminiscent of the finest concert pianist.

LAST Saturday, Ayton Village Hall resonated to chimes as the St. Mary's Handbell Ringers performed a medley of tunes which employed the full register of tones, from bass to treble.

The campanologists, whose ages ranged from about 10-70, demonstrated remarkable powers of concentration, rhythm and dexterity.

Versatile performer brings several genres

to the stage

MULTI-FACETED singer-songwriter Helen Watson plays at the Cask next

Helen is a unique performer whose idiosyncratic songs cross the boundaries of several musical genres including blues, soul, jazz and folk.

Over an extensive career she has performed and recorded with many well-known artists including Joe Cocker, Andy Fairweather-Low, Christine Collister, Emmylou Harris, Linda Ronstadt and Snake Davis.

Helen began her career in the late 60s. She became the singer with blues band Loose Lips and later a member of Manchester quartet Well Knit Frames.

Her singing and songwriting abilities earned her a recording contract with EMI. Her first album, Blue Slipper, was produced in Los Angeles by Glyn Johns and featured musicians such as Albert Lee, Little Feat and Bernie Leadon.

Helen became a member of vocal ensemble Hell Bent Heaven Bound, with whom she toured Europe, the USA and Canada. A short time later she joined the female supergroup Daphne's Flight.

In more recent years she has per-

formed regularly with the Burden of Paradise alongside ensemble, Snake Davis.

Earlier this year Helen produced a stunning new album in collaboration with another member of the Burden of Paradise combo, guitarist Mark Creswell. It shows off her versatility to perfec-

The promoter says: "She may look like your favourite schoolteacher but she sounds like a cross between Armatrading, Roberta Flack and Amy Winehouse, somehow mixing blues, dance, trance, country and soul-

ful melodies into one cohesive whole". The support act next Tuesday is singer-songwriter Shannon, who was Radio York's songwriter of the year in 2006. Anna has performed at folk clubs and festivals
