

## Flipper Love

"It's hard to do something real and different and new," groans Bruce Loose two tracks into Love, the second reunion album from Flipper, whose antagonistically slow-grinding sound - a late '70s riposte to hardcore's high-velocity presaged grunge. Key nihilist Will Shatter, who snuffed it in '87, is replaced this time by Nirvana's admiring ex-bassist. Novoselic (who has since left the band), and with drummer Steve DePace and dronemeister guitarist Ted Falconi they certainly have

their nightmarish churn down pat - but therein lies the problem. Flipper were aweinspiringly inept, ever on the cusp of degenerating into random noise - and were thus heroic. Play properly, and you're just not Flipper. Worse, these days Loose is not a man to shriek "sex bomb baby, yeah" over and over for five minutes, and his cant about TV and parents doesn't feel like a suitable replacement - or "different and new". Fight, recorded live in '07, is thankfully more ragged. Andrew Perry
