ANGELS AND AIRWAVES

"We Don't Need to Whisper" CD Honestly, how did you think this album was going to turn out? It's pretty damn good, but over-hyped much more so. Saving things like the American PINK FLOYD or THE POLICE just sets the bar so high for yourself that it's hard to live up to the expectations. This is the case with "We Don't Need to Whisper." This is a really good album, but isn't revolutionary. With instrumental buildups, it seeks a big sound, which suspiciously disappears any time the vocals come into play, leaving the listener wanting more. What they have done a good job of is separating themselves from the crowd. For what it's worth, ANGELS AND AIRWAVES does have an almost unique sound, and distinguishes itself from BLINK or BOXCAR. With a range of complexity, it also prevents itself from simply becoming background music, which works against it as well as for it. This isn't an easy CD to put in for a short car ride or for shuffle on the iPod, but taking the time to sit and listen is rewarding. Yet, for what it's worth, this album isn't the work of the world's next big rock hand, and considering that's what it's aiming for ... well ... it just falls short and gets left behind by its own hype. THE BELL RAYS

"@ The Barfly" DVD

The might BELLRAYS caught in all of their glory. Sixty one minutes of the hot Rock 'n' Soul recorded at the Camden Barfly in London England in April of 2005. BELL RAYS

"Have A little Faith" CD

The opening track on this is pure '70s soul, sounds like it is a lost song off of the "Scream, Blacula, Scream" soundtrack. BETWEEN THE WARS "Less We Believe" EP

BIGWIG

"Reclamation" CD

BIGWIG hits hard with Reclamation. They open their fourth album stronger than most bands with "A War Inside", and are able to keep up with the high expectations throughout the remainder. The vocal approach of Tom Petta only amplifies the lyrical quality of this record. He mixes the aggression of early John Feldman of GOLDFINGER with the catchy approach of Fat Mike from NOFX. Mixed, it becomes its own sound, perfect for carrying the common political BIGWIG message (stronger than ever) through 11 great, melodic tracks. "Follow the

Leader" shows off more of the band's musical diversity with metal infused guitar riffs that open the track. "Rat Race" is a very creative concept. lyrically. FRANK BLACK "Fastman Raderman" CD

I was honestly thinking (hoping) that we would see a new PIXIES record out before a new FRANK BLACK opus. The band seemed to be on quite a roll with the touring that they have been doing, but maybe they don't like each other that way anymore (yet?). Instead the seemingly always prolific Mr Black slams down a double disk that is full of a vast array of quality music. The roster of guest musicians on this is pretty amazing, the rhythm sections from Motown, Stax, Muscle Shoals and Phil Spector's Wrecking Crew, as well as Levon Helm of the BAND, Tom Peterson of CHEAP TRICK, Buddy Miller and Marty Brown. Both disks are on the mellow side, with the rockers few and far between. with nothing as unhinged as his earlier work. This is almost Frank Blacks tribute to American music, with heavy doses of country rock and a soul and or blues influence on a lot of tracks. I'm not really sure how I feel about this one, I think it's too early to tell. This will definitely need a few more listenings to digest. (JC) (Back Porch)

"Creep Cool" CD

THE BOUNCING SOULS "The Gold Record" CD

It feels like it's been an eternity since the last new BOUNCING SOULS record, doesn't it? For years, they put out a CD every 2 years, like clockwork, from 1995 - 2003. So waiting three years this time around, that put some serious pressure on them as far as I'm concerned to churn out their best work to date. And it should come as no surprise to anyone that they not only lived up to those lofty expectations, but surpassed them. The SOULS are one of those rare bands that have never been content to simply



find a sound and stick with it, simply working within the confines of their style years after year. They are constantly pushing the envelope, trying new things, and redefining themselves and, at the same time, redefining what punk rock can be. Compare any one of their CDs to their next release after that one - you'll find similarities, but you'll find so much

is different. That's something that has always set them apart from the pack, and this time around, they push it eve further and the results are beyond compare. A song like 'The Messenger' sounds more like THE WHO, yet they also churn out 'So Jersey,' which is so SPRINSTEEN-esque it's scary. Then include 'The Pizza Song,' which even includes an accordion, giving it that pizza-shop feel - goddamn, these guys keep doing this nobody else has even thought of. CAPTAIN BEEFHEART

"Under Review" DVD
